Herald Stall Writer As if to once and for all drum it into the minds of Halton Hills residents that the area's amateur talent is among the best in the province, Nornic Studio is bringing back John Smedley and Lynn Welton for a special musical celebration in honor of the opening of the new library-cultural centre.

Fans raved endlessly about this dynamic duo when they performed at Knox Presbyterlan Church in Georgetown last year. The Smedley-Welton repertoire for that evening emphasized light, easy-on-thecar opera, and more is planned for the program this Friday beginning at 8 p.m.

"We've prepared a mixture of arias and duets, some Gilbert and Sullivan, Offenbach, Tosti--all done in English," Mr. Smedley told The Herald Friday, later mentioning Donltzetti, Mezart and pieces from "La Boheme".

Veterans to the stage themselves, Mr. Smedley and Mrs. Welton will introduce an accomplished planist to the "Celebration of Music" audience. Ella Jackson, who conducts private plano lessons in Georgetown, will be making - her local debut. Rachel Smedley, Mr. Smedley's elevenyear old daughter, will also accompany the duet of plano. Enid Williams-Nicholas, who is directing "Celebra-

tion", says Nornic was fortunin finding as qualified a planist as Mrs. Jackson. Amateur productions, in which rehearsal time is scarce and the performance pivots on the confident professionalism of the people involved, flow that much more smoothly when the accompanist is an especially talented music reader.

"We beard about Mrs. Jackson through two sources stating how well qualified she was," Mrs. Williams-Nicholas

"If they're good, they are exceptionally busy," Mr. Smedley added. "Where have you been hiding all this time?" Staging for the "Celebra-

tion" is as light as the musical program it surrounds. Mrs. Williams-Nicholas said the setting will be in a common living room or drawing room, recalling a not-so-bygone era in which talented friends and family members would retire to the plano after supper to exchange songs.

"It will give warmth to the presentation," she said, "because, set on the stage apron, it allows intimate contact with the audience."

Nornic knows all about "intimate contact" with its audlences and has used dramatic, close-to-the-viewer settings with abundant success in several productions, including last year's immensely popular classic "Murder in the Cathed-

Unfortunately, Georgetown residents missed the opportunity to see the play performed locally, apathetically ignoring ticket notices. But, performed in Brampton's Emmanuel (United) Church, last December, the play drew sell-out crowds each night of its run.

Now, Nornic plans to use the church setting again, this time to produce a musical play entitled "The Hollow Crown". Once again, Mr. Smedley and Mrs. Welton will handle the play's musical components along with Wally Bearg. Four readers, Florence O'Connor, Glen Tarlin, John Day and the play's director, Bev Nicholas, will present the narrative, an exciting and haunting step back into history especially when performed in the caver-nous confines of a church nave. Emmanuel Church has al-

ready booked Nornic's "The Hollow Crown" for three nights, Nov. 13, 14 and 15 (contact Nornic at 877-0643 for ticket information). The studio is still looking for a George-town thurch to host the play
