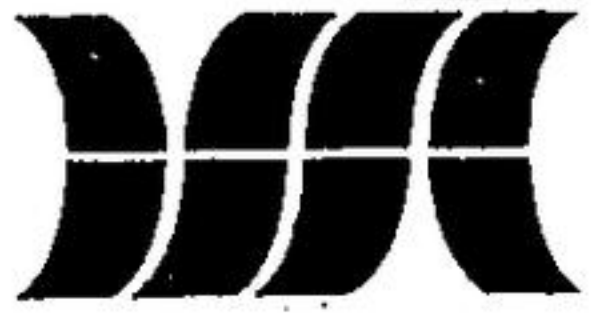

Another busy week is coming up on the art scene. No matter what your interests are, there's something going on for you.

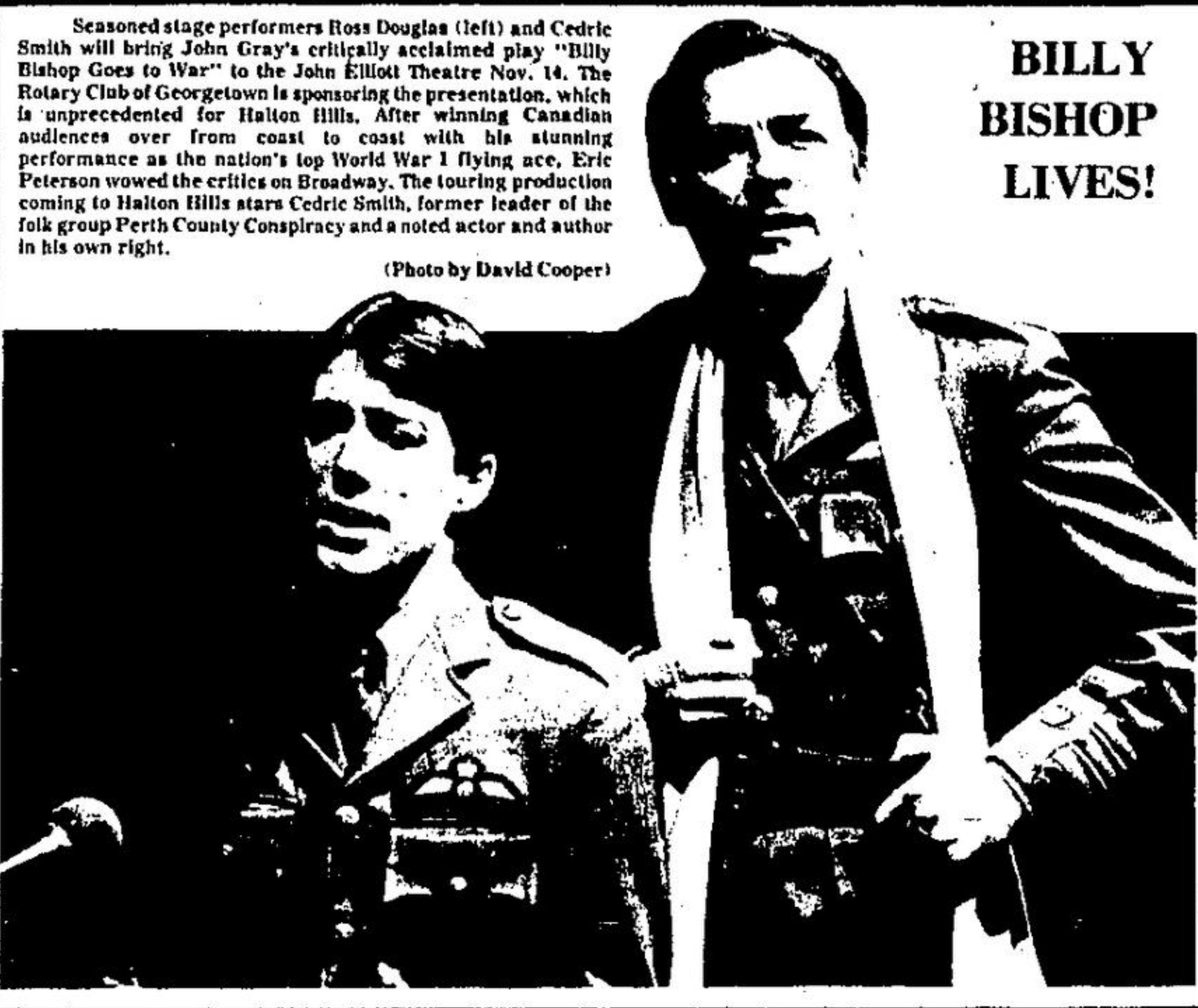
It all starts tonight with the Halton Hills Public Library presenting that fine folk group The Family of Man. Phone 877-2681 to see if any free tickets are still available for

the 7:30 performance at the Cultural Centre. This Friday (Oct. 30), Norvic Studio Productions presents "Celebration of Song," featuring Lynn Welton and John Smedley. Admission free but by ticket only. Saturday may be hallowe'en, but it's also a busy day on the cultural calendar. Why not head for Acton in the morning for the 12th annual Exhibition and Sale of Acton Arts and Crafts. You'll have an opportunity to see displays of hand weaving, leather work, hooking, batik, crochel, macramé, quilting, ceramics and much more. Artists and crafts people involved include: Jean Denny, Florence Wilkin, Del Howse, Irene Holmes, Judi Shannon and Laura Niltrich. This is all taking place at St. Alban's Parish Hall in Acton from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Admission is free and everyone's welcome.

If you plan your day properly, you can be back at the Cultural Centre for the 2 production of "Paddington Bear" by Erewhon Theatre, sponsored by the Halton Hills Public Library. Free tickets are all taken so if you have not already obtained yours, I'm afraid you're too late. That evening after shelling out to the ghosts and goblins, why not return to the Cultural Centre for the 8 p.m. Dance Spectacular, "An Evening of Dance," featuring Brian Foley Dance Studios presenting "1981 North American Junior and Senior Line Champions." Also Alda Ligita Sena School of Classical Ballet presents "Jonathan Livingston Seagull" and "Eine Klüene Nachtmusik." Tickets are \$3.50.

BILLY BISHOP LIVES!

"Now and Then", a drama about an antique shop where a young boy gets a glimpse of a different world, will be presented in four performances at the John Elliott Theatre starting Nov. 7. Theatre-on-the-Move, which has been touring Toronto area schools, hospitals, parks and malls for the past 13 years, presents this engaging children's tale Nov. 7 and 21 and Dec. 5 and 19 at the new Library-Cultural Centre. All performances start at 10:30 and tickets, at \$2 each (group rates available), are on sale through the recreation department (877-5185, extension 60) or at the door. Theatre-on-the-Move aims to create children's theatre of the highest professional standard, providing a personally involved and stimulating form of recreation. In addition, the company helps develop quality Canadian plays for children in association with new and established playwrights. This is the troupe's 28th original production based on the experiences and fantasies of children, over a million of whom have viewed their work. In "Now and Then", which is the name of the antique shop in the play, a fatherless boy named David Freeman believes, like most people, that the "grass is always greener on the other

side of the fence". One day, however, an unusual antique turns up in the shop his mother operates and David gets a chance to see that other side of the fence. "Now and Then" was written by Jim Bros, artistic director of Theatre-on-the-Move. He has been involved over the years with Toronto Free Theatre and Gryphon Theatre and, with his current company, has authored plays for children dealing with such topics of concern as peer pressure, alienation and teacher-student relationships. Already a Theatre-on-the-Move veteran, Perry Lewis will appear as David Freeman, lending the play his remarkable sensitivity and energetic appeal.
