Walleye making b-i-g news

WALLEYE fishing is making big news these days. It seems the big fish are making a good showing this year, with a 1621/4 pounder caught recently. The season is open until March 31st in area 15 and all year in area 18, and these cover the Georgian Bay shoreline and Moon Basin, where the lunkers hang out.

Use a six inch Rapala as the smallest size with the nod going to the number 18s Rapala. The new magnums mentioned here recently should be excellent for the large Walleye, and this line of lures has inter-connecting books.

This means the hooks are connected to each other with wire and won't pull out of the lure as those rigged with screw-eye and split ring. A 15-pound walleye can wreck a lure in short order, and if you tie into a Muskie there is a better chance of landing it on a Rapala. Slow troll the shoals and reefs for late season walleye, and don't forget the incidental catch; Pike to 20 pound, Muskie to 50 pound, Bass until Nov. 30, Rainbow Treut and Sturgeon. ALL LEGAL

They are all available in the same water and all legal. Check the summary of the fishing regulations for exact dates, and have fun. While we are on the subject of Pike, a little known fishery exists for huge pike in places such as Lake Ontario. All the great lakes contain good populations of pike that head for the deeper water during the warm water season, and these fish cruise back when the temperature drops.

These Pike weigh as much as 15 to 20 pounds and can be caught off the shore of Lake Ontario, if you can find a weed bed that drops off into deeper water.

They are not available along ALL the shoreline, but where they are, the fishing is top rate. Fish a live sucker minnow or other bait fish at the edge of the weeds or slow troll the weedling.

With some changes in the "All Year" areas covered by the fishing regulations the Credit River could prove to be as good as the Saugeen or other top fall Rainbow Trout

There is a lot of fish in the river, but a very small area open to fall anglers. There is a lot of talk about damage to the "resident" fishery, or those fish that are resident all year and never leave the river.

However, the methods used for fall rainbows, very seldom take the brook trout that are in the river, or other . species for that matter. We must apply pressure to the Ministry of Natural resources to open more of "our" river for fall fishing, and releive some of the pressure on other rivers and on us fishermen as well.

It is not always possible or practical to travel all the way to the Saugeen or up to Owen Sound for a days fishing, especially with the cost of travel these days. NEW KNIFE
