Catholic Women's League studies volunteer programs

CWL PUBLICIST The Catholic Women's League October meeting was presided over by Mary Tucker, 1st Vice President, in the absence of Helen Callagahan, President, who is ill.

Trudy Edwards introduced the guest speaker for the evening, Anne Pride, who is co-ordinator for the different volunteer groups that come into the Vanier Centre for Women and the Ontario Correctional Institute for men in Brampton.

The Vanier Centre and the O.C.I. are Provincial Institutions of medium security with a maximum length of sentence being two years less one day. The ages range from 17 to 23 years in both institutions, but older people do reside there.

Women residents at Vanier live in editages and are free to move around during the day. Many have medical, alcohol and drug problems. Some are responsible for one or more children who they leave in the care of their family, a friend or the Children's Aid Society. These women tend to be poorly educated and have low self-

At O.C.I., male residents are often emotionally disturbed, having committed crimes against persons, not property. These men are usually sentenced to short terms in the Institution and it is difficult to get more than a small degree of success working for such short periods, Ms. Tucker said. Like the female residents of Vanier, the male residents of O.C.I. are for the most part lacking in education and have no job skills. When released, many return back again into institutions as they rarely manage to find jobs.

There are a number of Volunteer Programs being run at both Vanler and O.C.I., but more volunteers are needed to counsel, talk and befriend these people, many of whom are lonely and really need to form a special relationship with someone who could help them integrate back into the community.

Volunteers are needed in an educational capacity just to teach the alphabet and phonetics, some inmates being totally illiterate. In the area of recreation, people are needed to help form choirs, drama groups or some other group. For people who have little




