



# McFadyen Raider of the Month

The Georgetown Chrysler Raider executive have named forward Gary McFadyen "Raider of the Month" for October.

McFadyen, who played some of his minor hockey in Georgetown, is a local product who was drafted by the Toronto Maple Leafs and spent time with Dallas and New Brunswick before heading to the International League for three seasons, ending up with Milwaukee.

Gary says it was his life-long dream to play professional hockey and he "appreciated the opportunity". He was active in soccer and baseball in his youth in Georgetown besides hockey, and he still plays softball in the Georgetown Industrial league.

The swift-skating forward has one of the best shots in the Intermediate A league. He returned last year to the Raiders after his stint with pro hockey and has since opened

his own sports store with co-owner Bill Marcolini. They operate M and M Pro Sports on Mountainview Road South. Raider general manager Dave Kentner says the Raider of the Month award is given to players who contribute more to the team than just statistics. However, even in the stats department McFadyen has excelled, scoring nine goals and eight assists in just seven games. He is currently ninth in scoring in the league.

Kentner says McFadyen's attitude, attendance and his play, which Kentner describes as being more relaxed, has contributed to "the important structure of the club."

Kentner says, "Gary offers both sides when offering opinions." Coach Gerry Inglis has noticed the improved play of McFadyen and said recently that his desire and hustle has to rub off on the other players, especially when the out of towners see him working so hard.

Gary leads the team in goals with nine and is third for most points thus far in the season. He also has two power play goals which is tied with Scott McKenzie for most Raider power play goals this season.

### Muskies feeding

Muskelunge: The big news is still big. Muskie fishing is getting better with the Indian summer weather. It is pleasant to fish, the muskies are feeding well hence the fishing is productive, heavy feeding time for the fish makes it an excellent time to be on the water.

The duck hunting in the areas that muskie fishing is done makes it a twofold sportsmen's paradise. There is also some good goose shooting in the Georgian Bay area and Honey Harbour is great.

Moon basin and the adjacent islands of Georgian Bay are producing lots of fish including Walleye, Muskie and Bass. Many flights of ducks are coming in to well-placed blocks of decoys and the occasional confidence decoy of a gull or other bird is always a great addition to your spread.

Remember that bass head for warmer water such as shoals when the sun is up. They need the warmth that the shallows provide and the food they seek does also. Walleye look for slow moving food at this time of year and a salamander is top bait now.

A recent article showing the infamous Bill Johnson nailing up a "No hunting" sign was very misleading. "Put away your rifle" was the statement when anyone that knows what they are talking about know that no rifles are allowed in the area in question.

The idea that Johnson is NOT opposed to the hunt is a new one on me and the statement by him saying "Raccoons do more damage to crops than deer" is sheer stupidity.

**POACHER PROBLEM**  
Poachers are a real problem as has been mentioned here several times. This writer has been after more conservation officers in the field for years, and can not even get deputized. Poachers are not hunters, they are plain thieves. No more no less; and should be apprehended as thieves. The sooner people call a poacher a thief and not a hunter, the sooner we will have a better understanding of what a hunter is and may even get more enforcement in the field.

Regular police officers should be trained to handle poachers and the number of officers increased in order not to over burden the force.

If the Ministry of Natural Resources would allow the deputization of citizens that are willing to be trained, we would have another united front against theft of our natural resources. Personally, I would feel much better when confronting a law breaker if I was carrying a deputy badge, and would be willing to invest my own time and money to get the education and training the ministry feels I need for this responsibility.

The hunt clubs in Quebec were out in force last weekend. The Quebec authorities allowed a one day season on does and fawns. The clubs reacted to this news even though it was the first such allowed since 1964. On club property no does or fawns were allowed to be taken and members stopped all other hunters they could reach in order to convince them it was wrong.

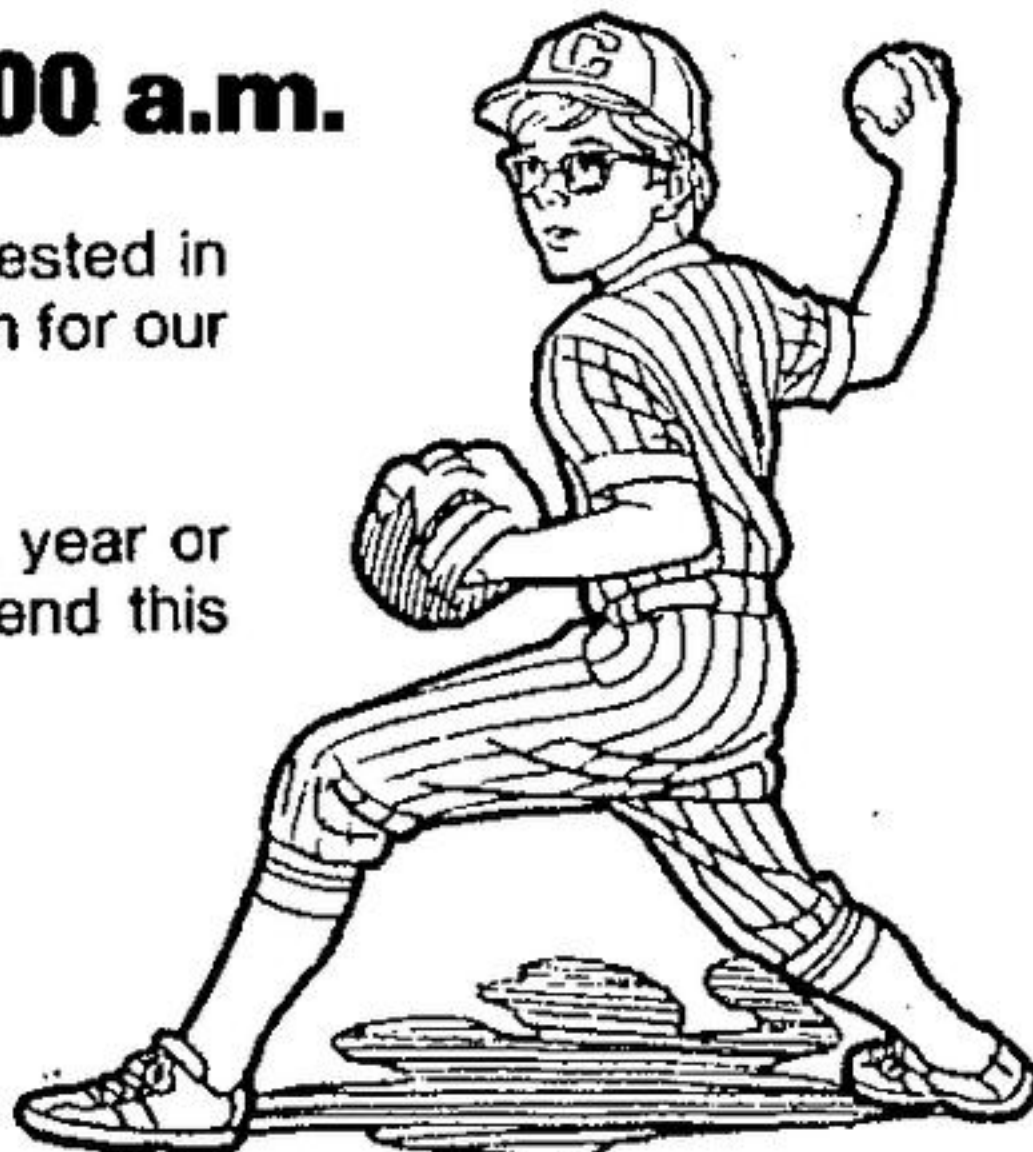
