Although Kris said he and Kelly couldn't have skated much better, he admitted they will have to work harder at their compulsories which held them down in the competition. He and Kelly skated more consistently than they did three weeks ago at St. Ivel, he says.

Overall, the Canadian team were one point out of first place, which eventually went to the American team.
