

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


Some parents have been invited for interviews, as noted on the Interim Report, but all parents are welcome to meet the teachers.

NOTICE OF INCREASE IN PENALTY TO BE CHARGED ON ARREARS OF TAXES LEVIED IN 1981

The Town has recently been imposing a penalty for late payment of taxes levied in 1981 equal to 1.25% of the amount unpaid on the 1st day of default and on the 1st day of each calendar month thereafter. Effective December 1st, 1981 this penalty is being increased to 1.896%. A penalty of 1.896% of the amount of all taxes levied in 1981 and unpaid at December 1st, will be added to the unpaid balance on that date.
