In an earlier article, the "phantem save" was introduced. A "save" occurs at a special time when, for example, the north-south arrives at a contract of 4 spades vulnerable to earn plus 620 points.

To prevent the north-south pair from scoring the above, east-west, not vulnerable, might bid 5 clubs. In this contract, east-west may very well be unsuccessful and allow the north-south pair to defeat their contract by a number of tricks.

Even if the north-south pair doubles the east-west bid and

defeats it by three tricks the when east-west makes a bid score the north-south pair would earn is 500 points. This is a "save" for the east-west pair since north-south was prevented from earning the 620 they would have received for the 4 spades; a saving of 120 points.
