lure to do the job and I'll get the satisfaction of seeing the kid get his first trout.

Bob was presented with a plaque from the Rapala Company for his work in promoting fishing with younger children, but he shuns recognition. He sees his work well rewarded if it helps to keep local youths off the streets, he says.

As a conservationist, Ollivier feels the government could be doing more in the area of wildlife. He says groups need to be educated through discussion and such measures as the re-introduction of the fishing licence and more conservation officers are required.

OWN SHOW
Bob was active for five years with his own cable T.V. show with Halton Cable in which he showed films, had guest speakers and demonstrated products. He would like to get more involved with speaking to groups, but

still loves to talk about the outdoors on a one-to-one basis, he says. Many of his friendships have been started over the discussion of one of his columns, he says.

Fishing manufacturers often solicit Bob's help in testing new product lines to be marketed for the outdoorsman. He readily obliges his time to test fishing and hunting equipment.

As well, Ollivier is an accomplished journalist, submitting book reviews for publication plus writing a church column and the occasional magazine article. Bob is a devout church-goer and says religion is an important reason why he is writing. One of his favorite motto's is taken from scriptures: "My tongue is the pen of a ready writer."

Bob is active with his Maple Ave. Baptist church as a choir member and he also teaches the occasional

adult class for the congregation.

Bob has had his share of work experiences, once owning his own photography studio in town. He originally came to Georgetown in 1955 and worked on the introduction of a new Canadian fighter aircraft.

A stint with the post office resulted in a back injury which has caused him considerable pain over the years, but he has shunned medication. "Pills don't do anything for me," he says. "What's needed is PMA (Positive Mental Attitude)," he adds.

A cherry face and a welcome member of The Halton Hills Herald staff, this fisherman, hunter, conservationist, anti-pollutionist, gardener, writer, lure collector, lecturer and PMA'er has done much to brighten the outdoors scene in Halton Hills and it's many outdoors enthusiasts.
