The Leathertown Association report on the restoration of the old town hall states that "the expense is not justified based on the potential costs involved."

The report adds that it may be less expensive to construct a new facility for the services proposed for the old town hall than to restore the structure.

As a result of the report, commissioned when Leathertown intended to take over the building itself, association chairman Chip Petrillo says the hall simply cannot be restored to its original struct-

Operating costs, location and the building's architecture hamper any effort to renovate. rent and maintain the building, the report states.

The association had intended to purchase the half on Willow Street from council for \$1, and with municipal funds intended for demolition and funds from the Actario draw restore the building, Mr. Petrillo sald.

Neither the restoration committee nor Actarlo support the association proposal but both groups have proposed to enovate and lease the build-

The report, prepared by R. M. Pow Limited, consulting engineers, of Woodstock, is lengthy, but states it is "only a brief overview of the condition

of the facility, proposed uses and likely costs involved."

The report calls for a more in-depth report to take into account the growth trends of

says, "it would be our impression at this time that the expense (total renovation \$130,000 to \$160,000 plus \$20,000 annual operating costs, not including staff and additional consulting fees) is not justified based on the potential costs

involved..." "We would have to see evidence of a definite need for the floor space in the particular location, but in any case, retention of this facility even with a revenue-producing use will be more expensive than

construction of a new facility." The removal of the rear portion of the town half and abutting fire hall together with the side street location are negative aspects and renovating would be more justified if it were at a main Intersection or on a T-intersection of a busier street.

To provide any parking to the hall would require the additional expense of purchasing an adjacent lot.

The building does not have to be tern down due to irreparable or insurmountable required repairs, the report states, but the consultants did find evidence of needed repair in the bell tower area.

The weekly mortgage payment plan is the same as paying an extra amount every month in an open mortgage. But it has a psychological advantage over open mortgages in that the more frequent payments are smaller amounts "which makes it easler for the member to budget."
