Lori, a Grade 12 student, is president of the club and assistant stage manager, and holds down a couple of supporting roles in the play.
"There's a whole different feeling with this year's production," she said.
The Cultural Centre stages the enthusiasm of the cast and reflects a scene of professional pride.

A number of costumes have been rented for this play and a great new dimension has been added through the introduction of choreography under the direction of Judith Roesman, a new teacher this year at GDHS. Judith herself has been dancing since childhood and teaches theatre arts and English at the school.

Previous years' productions, including Bye Bye Birdie, Oliver and Anne of Green Gables, have all met with great success, but this one hints of something special, due to the combination of many exciting factors.

A number of students in the cast have held parts with the Georgetown Little Theatre group and that experience reflects well within this group.

The club's membership is close to 90 people including about 20 who are in the school band under the leadership of Mr. Ussel, musical director for the club and music teacher at GDHS.

Transforming "Eliza Doolittle", played by Cheryl Mills, into a refined creature of etiquette and speech has been a lot of fun for the cast and main character "Higgins", played by Bill Marchant.
