

Youth Soccer Club:

Addressing old problems, but recommending new solutions...

Report on the 14th Annual General Meeting of Georgetown Youth Soccer Club: Elected and Appointed for 1982:

There remain only a few vacancies to be filled by the Spring meeting reflecting a healthy situation at this time of year. 1981 closing reports from the executive and commissioners were made, with several points of discussion arising.

An increase in registrations was recorded for the 4th successive year, and topped 1,000 for the first time. Player absenteeism appeared as a general problem and limitations to registration of these players were suggested. The club is to consider

giving coaches some "clout" to deal with absenteeism.

Differences in playing regulations between boys and girls sections caused confusion and is referred to the new executive for uniformity.

FIELD SHORTAGE

The playing field shortage was handled by game time reduction and the use of Nielson field. Nielson is likely to be lost in '82 due to company expansion. The Irwin Dorsey field may also be lost due to the recent closure news. Repair work has already been carried out to the present fields. Control of the lights at Cedarvale may be moved to inside the Community Centre. It is believed that repair of school fields would alleviate the field problem for all outside users.

The club is ahead of the budget in finance. The club shows an operating gain on the year of \$1,000 plus, with the town bill for field use and lighting yet to come.

The gain reflects a prudent buying policy, sponsorship and interest income—all not in the adopted spring budget. The club will be faced with increases from Ontario and

Peel Halton associations for 1982 according to current information available.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Policy for next year carries several recommendations from the retiring board. The reintroduction of house league competition at major mosquito, minor and major pee-wee and bantam, and junior divisions has been approved.

No-points standings will be maintained and published in other divisions. An indoor soccer league proposal has been referred to the new board.

House league select team coaches are to be appointed early in the year. These teams will have the advantage of early preparation for any tournaments and will play regularly against our "rep" teams and possibly play "up" against house league teams.

A similar program is being prepared for our regular representative teams. Rep team coaches have to be confirmed and appointed by

31 January due to their league registration dates.

AMALGAMATION

The youth club has agreed to exploratory talks with local senior and youth clubs with a view to amalgamation under one banner. One of the aims is to provide a normal

and regular progression from beginner youth to advanced soccer player.

The introduction of a soccer club handbook containing calendar of events, constitution, rules, league and cup scheduling, membership, coaching hints and other

items has been approved and is in preparation.

The outgoing executive were warmly thanked for their work and support throughout the year as one of the best ever by retiring president, Alex Tough.

The elections were conducted by George Baines who

welcomed Klaus Zander as the new president. Klaus has been active in the youth club as coach, commissioner and referee for several years.

Some 20 members and guests were present at the meeting which took place at the Alcott Arena in under 2½ hours on Sunday morning.

The game was a complete team effort with goals by Paul Glass and Paul Smith keeping the visitors off the scoreboard until the midpoint of the third period.

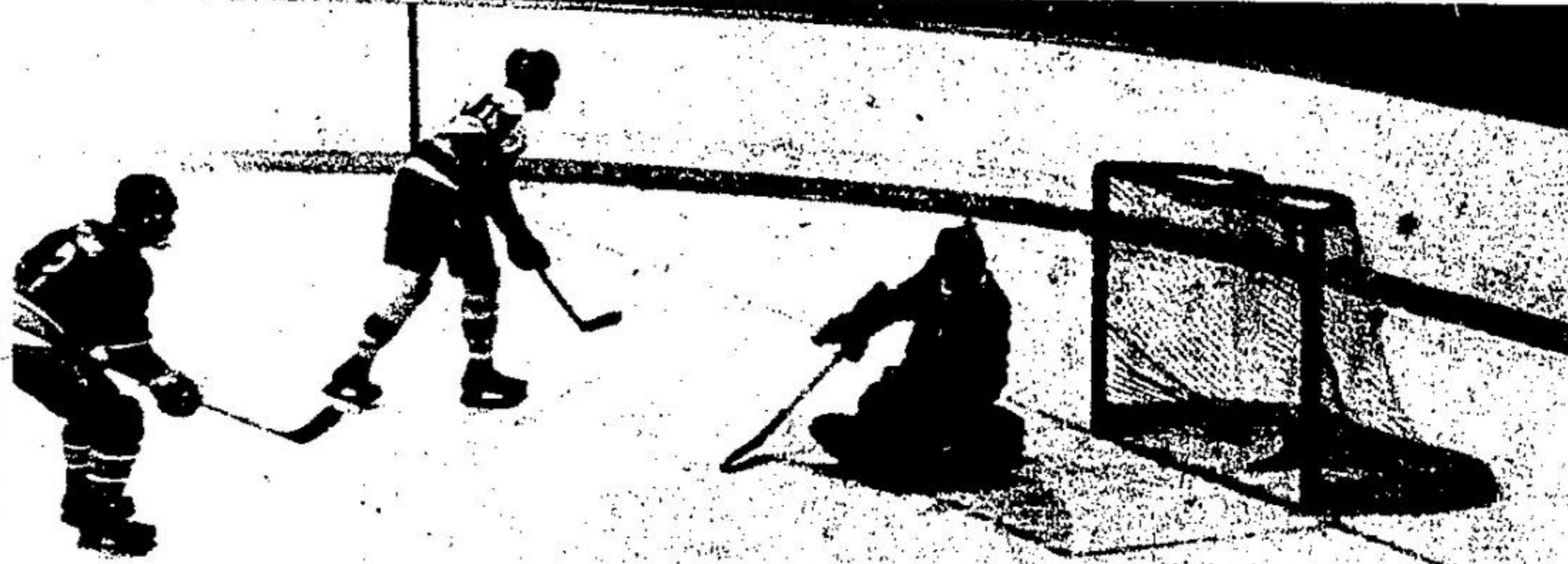
Girls hockey team gets first tie
