Hardball lights impossible

Representatives from the Georgetown Baseball Asso-(GBA) Pat ciation Burroughs, Dan Guistini, Colin Brookes and Finn Poulstrup talked with the Recreation Director of Halton Hills Tom Shepard for an hour recently in a meeting to ask for hardball lights.

The verdict stands that the Recreation Department can't put up the hardball lights required for a Junior Ball club which has been entered for the 1982 season.

However, the Recreation department did commit themselves to erect softball lights on the diamond across from the Georgetown Armories. The lights will be on 75 ft. standards instead of the regular 45 ft. standards usually required for softball Lighting.


