**Holy Cross finish season as Halton champs**

The girls' volleyball team from Georgetown's Holy Cross Separate School won the Halton County Separate School volleyball championships by defeating George Vanier from Oakville 15-5 and 15-6 last week.

The Holy Cross team, coached by Miss Cynthia Tobin, have now won the Halton volleyball crown for three years in a row. In the six team, round robin tournament, Holy Cross won all five games and won both games in the championship round.

Coach Tobin attributed the girls' win to their extensive practice schedule and the number of exhibition games they have played (the team has won 111 games of 117 games played since Oct. 1).

The coach was impressed with the team's spirit and sportsmanship throughout the tournament. "Defence has been our strong point all year but in the Halton finals our spiking was phenomenal," the coach said.

The boys' team from Holy Cross also participated in the tournament, but they were defeated 15-11 by George Vanier in the semi-finals.

**Prepare now for ice fishing**

First off I want to thank Gord Clow of Maple Rock shooting range in Acton for correcting me on a mistake in last week's column. Please take note, the racoon season is closed Dec. 31 and not Feb. 28 as mentioned last week. The Ministry of Natural Resources sent out notices but mine never got here.

Please correct your copy of the Summary of the Hunting Regulation. The ministry should be more careful in the preparation of these forms or brochures yet they excuse themselves and absolve themselves by adding to the summary that it is indeed only a summary and not to be used as law.

The conservation authorities are still running busy programs geared to the season. Rather than list them here again, simply call the nearest and ask about the various programs and times. As soon as we get a good cover of snow, the ski and cross country program will commence, along with the snowshoe trails.

Unfortunately the snow mobiles will also make their annual noisy appearance. Too bad these machines could not be further controlled and used only on lakes or where long distance snow travel is important.

Open water fishing is still in full swing, with hot fishing off the shore of Lake Ontario at such places as Grimsby. Best catches of Brown trout are off the pier at Grimsby and at the mouth of the Credit river there have been some showing. The hydro generating station has a good fishery at this time.

**LAKEVIEW HAS BROWNS**

The Lakeview site has browns, salmon and a good number of steelhead, and spawn seems to be good bait. Trollers have been using Fire-plugs, Hot Shots, Flatfish, etc. to haul in good catches. Lake trout, browns and salmon are being taken below Bruce generating station near Port Elgin with spawn bags doing well and minnows a hot second.

Trotting in the area is, of course, very cold but very productive. Remember to wear a life jacket at all times in these cold waters even while wading. One slip and it could save your life. Personally, I carry more than a waterproof supply of matches. A small kit in my pockets contains fire starting materials as well as matches, and in another pocket, I carry a chemical mix that ignites when mixed. These two materials are only volatile when mixed and are packed with that in mind. It burns hot enough to start wet wood.

**ICE FISHING**

Have you started to prepare for the ice fishing season yet? Now is not too soon nor too late and my efforts to duplicate the BEST ice fishing jig I have ever seen have so far proved futile.

Hope I don't have to go through the season without one, and the one in my box now is an antique and I don't want to lose it. What a dilemma.

We should have a good snow fall by Christmas and ice safe to travel on by the second week of January, but this may be rushing things a little. The smaller of the ponds and lakes will freeze first and that is where the early action will be.

Large bodies of water such as Simcoe will take longer to freeze over, so check the fishing regulations for areas with open season and small waters to start the season early.

Starting next week, this column will carry a run down of the ice fishing areas and services. Cut it out and file it for future reference, and call me if you have some location that you would like to share.

Hints on the best methods of taking various fish will be included and anything else pertaining to the winter fishing season will be included. Grouse hunting has been excellent around the perimeter of Guelph, and the co-operative land use areas around Puslinch have also been hot.

The northern areas of the province have had great population of these wily birds, and the further north you go, the less wary they are. The areas around Lake Simcoe have seen good hunting, and grouse hunters are seeing lots of rabbit.
