GROUSE HUNTING Grouse hunting is still good, in fact I prefer to go at this time of year. The snow makes it a good hunt and the birds are easily seen, although skittish without cover, Some of my most memorable groupe hunting has been

done in the snow, and I hope to continue this over the holidays. If you want to go out don't go too early. The birds are not too active until about noon on cold days. This depends on the amount of sun, but they will feed again about one hour before dusk as they settle for the night.

Over the next few days, in between rich food, try PETER BREAD. This recipe is also good as a trail snack or food, and can be packed for a funch.

Make a regular or sour dough bread mix, and flour the top. Fold into a half moon to form a "pocket" of the dough, that is open one side. When baked, stuff this pocket with raisins or meat.

In fact you can stuff it with whatever hits your fancy. I prefer a mix of meats that can be eaten cold, or warmed over a trail fire. Very nourishing and as tasty as you wish to




