The Toronto International Boat Show runs Jan. 8 to 17 at Exhibition Place, Toronto. Over 1,000 craft on display and many features for boaters and fishermen who use boats. Just don't try trolling from the 42 foot sloop on display there.

Cold Creek conservation area has sled dog races Jan. 2, 3, 23, 24, and Feb. 13, 14, 20, 21, 27, and 28. Mark your calendar and head out to see some real winter fun. Jan. 9 at 11 p.m. at Cold Creek the family will enjoy what is called a Loppet. This is a long distance cross-country ski event, and this one covers 12km.

Warm fruit tea will be served and lots of activities for the whole family. Cold Creek conservation area is located on Concession road 11, 3km north of King Side road between Bolton and Nobleton.

The next general meeting of the Ontario Steelheaders and Salmon Fishermen will be Jan. 12 at 8 p.m. in the Oakville Library. If you are into salmon or Rainbow (Steelhead) then why not attend and join forces with these dedicated fishermen.

**ICE FISHING:** When out on the ice either early or late in the season, or on ice that may be unsafe, take along this simple rig. Drive spikes into two long pieces of dowl.

Make them about twenty inches long and the spikes can be hammered in or drilled. Tie these to a long cord that will fit around your neck, and hang on the outside of your coat. If you break through the ice, use them to dig into the ice and pull yourself onto hard ice. They may save your life or the life of a friend.

Do you own a sonar or depth sounder? Then use it on

the ice in winter. Simply add a little water on the ice to make contact and if the reading is good, THEN cut your hole.

If your hole is cut, or you use a commercial hut, it will tell you the bottom and maybe even if there are fish there.

**HUT OPERATORS:** Canning's Fish Hut Co., phone (705) 728-1878 for prices and information. Make sure when phoning this outfit, what they supply and the time you are expected to be on hand at their location.

Another question to ask is best directions and the weather up their way. It could make the difference to your outing. Canning's can handle about 130 anglers in their 25 huts, which are propane heated.

**GROUSE HUNTING:** Grouse hunting is still good, in fact I prefer to go at this time of year. The snow makes it a good hunt and the birds are easily seen, although skittish without cover.

Some of my most memorable grouse hunting has been done in the snow, and I hope to continue this over the holidays. If you want to go out don't go too early.

The birds are not too active until about noon on cold days. This depends on the amount of sun, but they will feed again about one hour before dusk as they settle for the night.

Over the next few days, in between rich food, try PETER BREAD. This recipe is also good as a trail snack or food, and can be packed for a lunch.

Make a regular or sour dough bread mix, and flour the top. Fold into a half moon to form a "pocket" of the dough, that is open one side. When baked, stuff this pocket with raisins or meat.

In fact you can stuff it with whatever fish you fancy. I prefer a mix of meats that can be eaten cold, or warmed over a trail fire. Very nourishing and as tasty as you wish to make it.

The Ministry of Natural Resources achieved their 1981 salmon egg target. They gathered 280,000 egg eggs from the Credit river and 450,000 chinook eggs from various parts of the Province.

They are currently incubating at the Ringwood Hatchery Culture station. Now if the ministry had gathered 450,000 coo eggs as well as chinook, well a lot more fishermen would be happy. Have a good winter, and see you next year, see you next year, see you next year.

# Seniors have mixed luck

A two-piece vanity bathroom and a convenient mud room and storage facility are positioned midway between the family room and the enclosed single-car garage. The furnace, hot water tank and abundant luggage storage are accessible from the rear of the garage.

All four bedrooms are positioned on the upper level, accessible via stairway from the main foyer. Each has abundant closet storage facilities and excellent exposure for view and natural light, while maintaining privacy from adjacent dwellings. The spacious master bedroom features a full walk-in closet and a five-piece ensuite bathroom, with one vanity sink externalized for greater convenience during morning rushes. An angled dormer window provides for some interesting decor possibilities.
