The Rug Hanging Drive has gone over the top — which means Georgetown Rug Hookers will now be hooking 104 names instead of the planned 100.

It also means that the Halton Hills Library and Cultural Centre — for which the unique fund-raising campaign was in aid — is now \$3,000 closer towards having a piano. That's because the two rug hangings netted \$10,405 after expenses which was \$3,046 more than was required to fulfill Halton Hills Arts Council's \$20,000 pledge, made on behalf of all arts-related organizations.

The huge success of the Rug Hangings drive led Arts Council president Elizabeth Shore to write Mayor Pete Pomeroy requesting that the town credit any excess funds toward the purchase of a piano, since that was one item which was omitted to reduce basic building and furnishing costs. This

week, Mayor Pomeroy said he thought that a piano fund was a good idea.
