# OFAH annual conference Feb. 18

Results of the Molson's OFAH 1981 Big Fish contest are now finalized. Two fishies vied for top spot at an even 53 pounds each. In this case the longest fish wins and the prize went to Craig Dawson of Dryden with a Muskellunge of 56 1/2 inches, 1 1/2 better than Gary Ishill's monster.

Dawson won \$150 plus a 35 horse power Evinrude outboard for smashing the previous record. The Rainbow category went to Joseph Melock with a 24 1/2 pound 'Bow taken from Georgian Bay.

#### FISHING HUT OPERATORS

**ICE FISHING:** Lake Simcoe, call Bonnie Boats, one of the long time ice hut operators on Simcoe. They are mainly group fishing as they have 17 huts for 73 persons, and the atmosphere is friendly. On Jackson's point, near Sutton they have great success. Call them at (416) 722-3362. In Lake Nipissing try Dolphin Motel and Cottages. Bayden Brownlee runs a light ship (On the ice??) from 549 Lakeshore Dr., North Bay, PIA 2E3. Call him at (705) 472-5370 for reservations in one of his 22 huts. He can handle 88 anglers and the fishing has been good there.

A six man catch last year showed 12 walleye, 10 pike, 157 perch and 10 whitefish. Whitefish there run 5-9 pounds on the average with some as much as 10 pounds.

Locally try Fairy Lake in Acton. This lake has a large population of Pike, and many are taken through the ice in winter. Try various locations until you hit them, and fish the same areas under the ice and a visit to Fred's in Norval will get a supply of live minnows.

They are almost the only thing to take them some days, although I prefer jigs and take pike in Fairy Lake each year. Let me know how you do there or better yet, invite me to fish with you some Saturday.

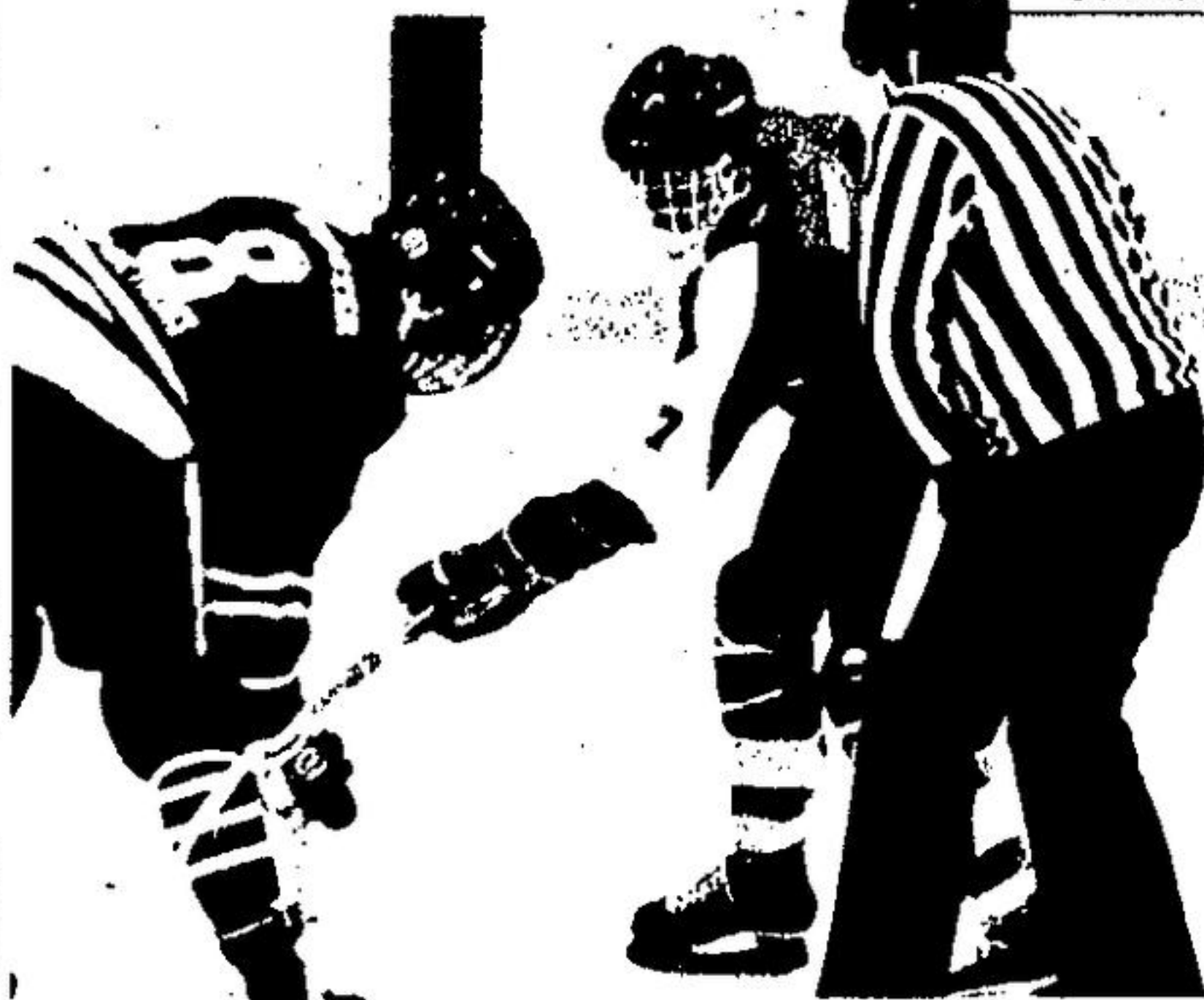
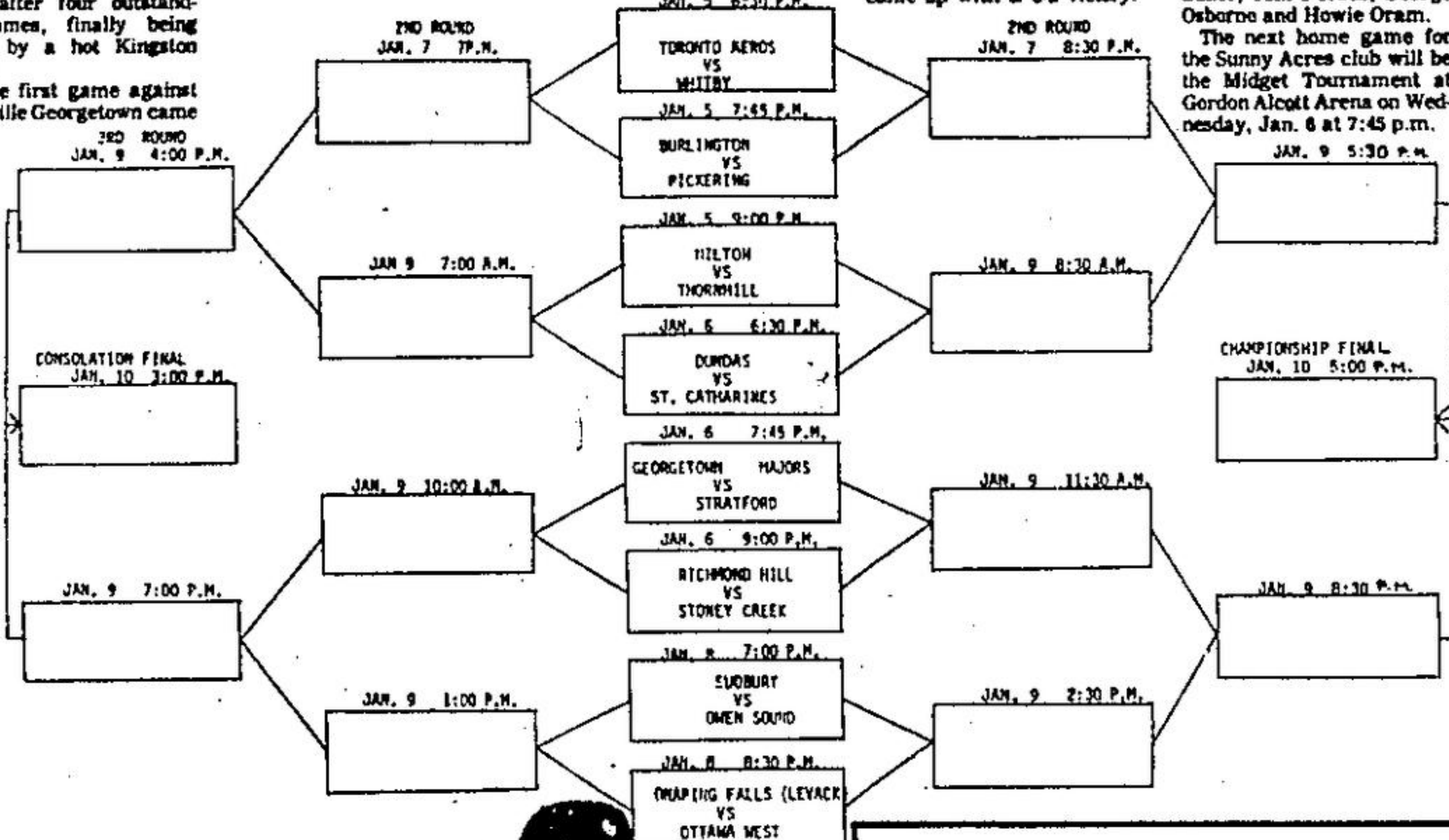
## Annual midget tourney should be balanced
