### High winds affect fishing

The high winds of last week and again this last weekend, have caused many problems. These are all newsworthy, and even the fishing outlook has been affected.

The ice between the mainland and Snake Island on Lake Simcoe, broke up and was replaced by a covering of slush ice that froze. Of course this is very dangerous and will not hold much if any weight. Other areas were effected also and the ice that formed since that time has "blown up" or broken up.

Usually the ice that forms after a blow like this will be rough. This is the reason why this column advises readers to check with an operator before heading up to fish, especially Lake Simcoe which is so unpredictable.

A few years ago I went to fish that lake with Jack Peard formerly of Georgetown, and the ice that had "blown up" was refrozen in unspending and jagged formation.

The going was, to say the least, rough. But the operator knew the best way out, and the fishing was worth the trip out.

The Terra Cotta Conservation Authority is warning everyone to keep off ice surfaces and make their children aware of the hazards.

#### BLUE ICE

Hard, blue looking ice of about two inches should hold a person walking or standing and the local lakes that have had a chance to freeze are greater than that.

Last Saturday I fished Fairy Lake in Acton, and the ice was clear and hard to a depth of about ten inches. Travel was safe and sure, but always check for weak spots where water comes into a lake or where current wears the ice thin.

The only species legal on Fairy Lake is Pike, and these fish locate near moving water if available. The edges of old weedbeds are another hot spot, and the knowledge I gain from fishing that lake in summer, stands me in good stead in winter.

Find a weedbed in about 6 feet of water and fish it when the sun is out for best results. Three minutes after dropping my hook into the depths, I had my first fish of the day. For those who want to try, I baited a Russian Hook jig with a dead minnow, and jigged near bottom very slowly.

The pike seem to travel about the bottom never moving farther than about two feet from the bottom weed cover.

If you want to try for Rainbow trout or spake, head up to Owen Sound where the fish can be seen checking your balls. Rainbow Fish Huts at (519) 376-0378 can accommodate about 50-70 anglers or at least they have 20 huts available this year.

They provide some tackle and live bait and besides the two fish mentioned there are also perch and whitefish to be taken there. As with all hut operators, call ahead.

On Lake Simcoe try Wally's Fish Huts at Cannington. Call them at (705) 437-2125 and get set for some hot fishing. They can handle 70 anglers in their 15 huts, and check to see what they provide before heading up. Lake Simcoe can hide its face in a blizzard on short notice so know the lake if you intend to go up on your own.

Carry a compass and always trust it to tell the truth, regardless of what you may think.

This week (the 15th) sees the end of the Grouse hunting season.

#### HARE RUNS TIL FEB.

Rabbit and hare run to the 28th of February so there are still some winter outings available for the hunter. This is when my snowshoes serve me well, and a sunny day sees great fresh air and exercise and maybe even game for the pot.

Remember to check your bird feeders daily, mine blew empty in the high winds of last weekend, and first thing Monday morning saw me refilling them.

The birds come early to the feeders after a bad night and the sooner you have food available for them, the more often they will come to your feeders.

Birds are a good indicator of future weather conditions. Friday a pileated woodpecker was tearing down a hydro pole in front of the Library in Georgetown.

Some careless person got too close to get photographs and scared it up high, but if you have never seen one of these huge birds from a range of ten feet then you have missed a lot.

There will be a turkey shoot at the Guelph Rod and Gun club on Feb. 7 at 9 a.m. Another will be held March 7th at the same time. If these times change I will inform you here.

The club is situated near Rockwood, and simply drive through the town of Eden Mills, make the next turn right and watch for signs.

News next week on a brand new bear belt, a new kind of clay pigeon shoot and other important news for hunters.

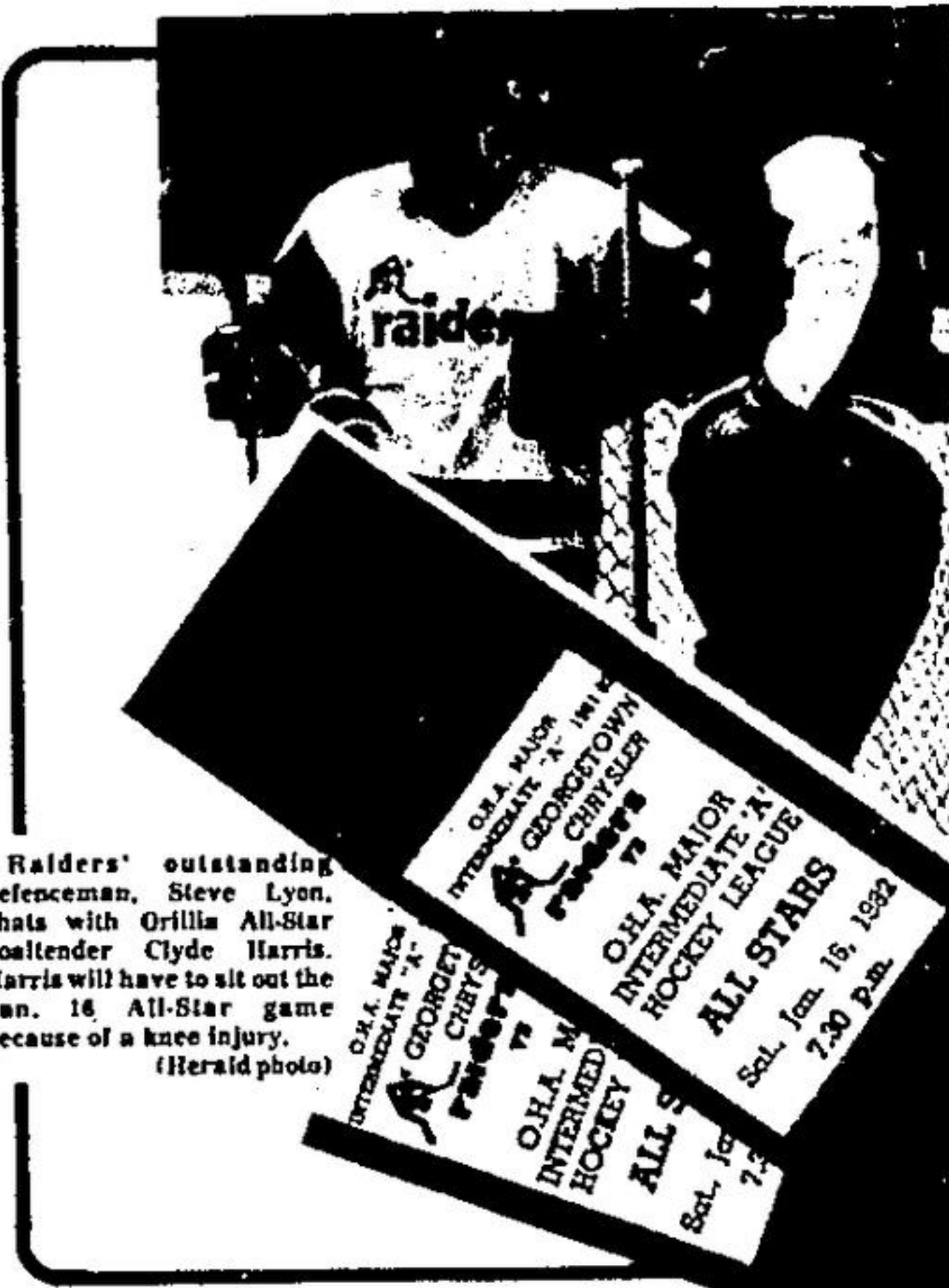
