Bob Dean's play inspires teammates to work harder

When the Georgetown Junior B Geminis are looking for a player to inspire the team they inevitably look to forward Bob Dean for his example.

"Bob Dean is a motivator," captain Bill Taylor says. "His play inspires others to play better," Taylor says.

Perhaps Dean's hockey experience away from Georgetown has given him a better perspective on what it takes to win hockey games in the Junior B league.

Last year Dean was in Sudbury trying out for the provincial A Sudbury Wolves. He ended the season with the Geminis, but not before spending some ice time with Newmarket Flyers along with Acton Sabres centre Dave McGiloway. The pair were roommates in Newmarket, but they, as well as seven other players, left the Newmarket team.

According to Dean his Newmarket coach was a little crazy which led to many players leaving the team, but with the Flyers he was taught how important winning should be to hockey games.

Dean played all his minor hockey in Georgetown for rep teams. He played Major Midget while still Minor Midget age and learned positional play from his coach Neil

Cotton. Georgetown Geminis executive member Jim Mackie was his manager for four different minor hockey teams, Dean says. During his Pee Wee days Dean scored 50 goals in 26 games and finished second in the league scoring.

In his third season with the Geminis, Bob Dean at 18 years of age has two years of Junior B eligibility left.

Two highlights on a personal note for Dean came when he scored his first Junior B hat-trick against Barrie two years ago and his recent selection to the Miracle Mart Junior B All-Star tournament.

The grade 13 Georgetown District High School student would eventually like to play hockey in Europe and he is thinking of working in Western Canada.

This year the Geminis had a certain amount of pressure put on them to win, but after last Sunday's win against Acton, Dean feels the team can challenge the Sabres for the final playoff spot. "When we put our minds to it, we can beat anyone," Dean says.

Everyone is starting to heat, but the big thing is for everyone on the team is hustle, he says.

Milton protest ends Oakville's streak

The Oakville Blades of the Central Ontario Junior B league had their 28 game unbeaten string broken by a technicality over a player signing last week.

In a game played against the last place Milton Flyers, Oakville used a player in the game which they had signed by a player card, but they had not received an official OHA confirmation which was reportedly still in the mail.

Milton protested against the player and the only reason they knew about the player was because they wanted to sign him also, Gemini general manager Bob Tost said.

When asked by The Herald to comment on the situation, Gemini's Tost said his feelings were that the OHA did what they had to do, but that it was "cheesy" for Milton's GM Vern Gooding to claim he himself had never used an illegal player in a game.

It was still two important points for the Milton Flyers who were losing the game against Oakville 10-1.

Georgetown now have to worry about catching up to the eighth place Acton Sabres before Milton topples the Gems from their ninth place position. Only two points separate the teams at the moment.

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
