The Georgetown District High School swim team maintained their excellence in the pool with their latest victory coming last Friday against Acton and Brampton Centennial in a tri-meet exhibition.

The Georgetown Rebels won the swim meet with 289 points while Acton took 190 with Brampton trailing with 180.

Co-coach Shirlene Vella said after the meet the Rebels swam well, with the exception of the junior girls side which are in the process of developing their rookies. Andrea Norgate and Brenda Morrow are the only junior veterans, but Karen Pepper looks strong in the back-stroke, Vella said.

The coach is also looking for good things from swimmers Johanna Delroy and Whitney Greig.

For the senior boys, Eric Elson dominated his events as he won the senior 100 m breast stroke, senior 50 m butterfly, while anchoring the 200 m relay team consisting of Rick Eastwood, Malcolm McCloud, and Craig Carlie.

The Rebels are strong in the junior boys with some able veterans like Steve McCloud, Glen Farrell, John Morwick and Don Elson plus the support of rookies like John Millington, coach Vella said.

The senior girls will again be strong with the likes of Sheryl Thompson, Kim McCloud, Heather Gibbs, Sheila Macdonald and Heather

Michie as veterans who will add stability to the team. A former CASH carded swimmer, Ana Piqueras in grade nine will be helping the team on a rigorous schedule for practices to make sure they reach their potential for the Halton and Peel-Halton championships in February, coach Vella said.

## A Home Of Your Own

Here's an Impressive two-storey home design which contains as many conveniences in a spacious and logical arrangement as the impressive exterior suggests. The plan provides in excess of 2,100 square feet of finished floor area on two levels. Brick veneer and horizontal channel siding on the exterior, allied with large multi-paned formal windows, a pillared entranceway and a high, double-peaked roof, provides a visually interesting traditional exterior which is both durable and easily maintained.

The elevated, porticoed entry leads into a spacious reception foyer and stairway storage area, from whence traffic moves naturally to the right and down into the large rectangular sunken living room. The living room features a raised-beam masonry fireplace and a wide baby window, which latter could easily have a window seat installed for those with traditional decor tastes.

The formal dining room is elevated two steps from the living room, and is further separated via optional screen wall. The dining room connects to the large family room-lounge and has a sliding glass walk-through leading onto the rear balcony. The spacious family room-TV lounge features a second masonry fireplace and access to the rear balcony via sliding glass doors.

The well-planned long U-shaped kitchen, has plentiful counter-top work surfaces, abundant cupboard storage and a step-saving work triangle. The double-sink peninsula jets out to a small bay window comparison to the side yard of the home. A grill-top range and work counter divides the kitchen and family room. This could be constructed as a casual snack-bar counter, for those who prefer.

A spacious laundry-utility complex and two-piece vanity bathroom are positioned centrally to all lower level areas; and contain a stacked washer-dryer, and the furnace and hot water tank, for ease of servicing and maintenance. The laundry-utility area connects to the side patio, and hence, to the double-enclosed garage — thus serving as a mud room facility.

The stairway to the full basement is positioned adjacent to the upper level stairs in the main reception foyer. Here is abundant space for the future development of additional accommodations, services and/or recreational facilities.

All four bedrooms are positioned on the upper level. Each has ample closet storage facilities and good exposure for view and natural light. The spacious master suite has a three-piece ensuite bathroom with tub, a full walk-in closet and access to a rear facing balcony via sliding glass walk-through.

The main bathroom divides the vanity sink and linen storage closet from the tub and commode via convenient pocket door, for greater convenience during morning rushes.

Plans for design No. 877-2129B may be purchased either by the single set, at a cost of \$125.00 for the first set and \$25. for each additional set, or by the package. A five-set plan package, including the first set, is economically priced at \$180.00 and an eight-set package, also including the first set, is only \$220.00.
