While Halton regional officials are preparing guidelines for businesses which want to remain open Sundays, Acton's Old Hide House will likely have its exemption from the province's Retail Businesses Holidays Act extended until June. Regional council is expected to pass a bylaw this afternoon (Wednesday) similar to legislation passed a year ago allowing the leather goods business to remain open Sundays. Guidelines are expected to state tourist attractions which should be exempted from the Act and the Hide House (along with the community's Leathertown Association), hope to serve tourists coming to Acton on buses from northeastern U.S.


Salary boost irks rep

In an age when businesses and individuals are being told by government to cut back on spending, Coun. Harry Levy, the town's finance committee chairman doesn't like idea of giving the town's non-unionized employees a 12 per cent salary increase. Coun. Levy was the only town rep who voted against the raise Monday night, noting that some employees will also get a three or four per cent merit increase. Councillors discussed the proposed increase during a closed session last week and Coun. Levy told The Hraid Monday night that he thought other councillors shared his viewpoint following that meeting. However, he said, council's decision may make it harder for the town to deal with its unionized employees during future negotiations.

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
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
