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I've received your questions

It is nice to get those phone calls each week from my readers. Often with a word of thanks for the column, sometimes with a question. Some of the most often asked could be of help to others and these are sometimes the subject of future columns.

Recent questions could be answered here. Q. Is an ice auger worth buying? A. That depends on the amount of ice fishing you do, or intend to do. If you invest in a good ice auger, then you may wish to go more often.

They can be obtained from Fred's Bait and Tackle in Norval and possibly Canadian Tire. Mine cuts an 8 inch hole, and is good enough to pull a ten pound trout through.

Q. What size minnows do you use in Fairy Lake in Acton? A. For the only legal fish in that lake at this time of year, the Pike, I use a three or four inch minnow.

The pike are not too active and don't swim far, and I fish them just off bottom. Pike will also take a dead minnow so don't toss them away when they quit moving.

Q. What is the best way to get Whitefish in Lake Simcoe? A. Many fishermen set the spreader, a rig of three (or two sometimes) hooks radiating from a centre core of lead, on the bottom.

Probably the best method is to lift the spreader about a foot off bottom, and watch for the slightest movement of the tip up. Jig the spreader on occasion to attract fish to the area.

WHITEFISH SURPRISE

Whitefish are showing up in the Great Lakes with surprising numbers. Owen Sound is producing numbers of high Whitefish with ten pounders reported.

Try rivermouths and power plant outlets with a minnow and don't be surprised if one takes a spawn sack used for rainbows. The new fishing summary or fishing Regulations as they are better known is available.

There are many changes with sanctuaries in many new areas. I will try to draw your attention to these in the next few weeks in this column.

TROUT BACKCROSS

The Splake, as mentioned here is now called a Lake Trout backcross or Hybrid Lake Trout. The Splake program was a bust, as all knowledgeable fishermen know.

Now the ministry is changing the fish back into a lake

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trout, but going about it the long way. Why not simply admit the fish (splake) is no good and stock full lake trout.

In the past I mentioned here how good the splake is. I have fought them and eaten them, but still they do not reproduce, and are not as good as Lakers and cost more to produce.
