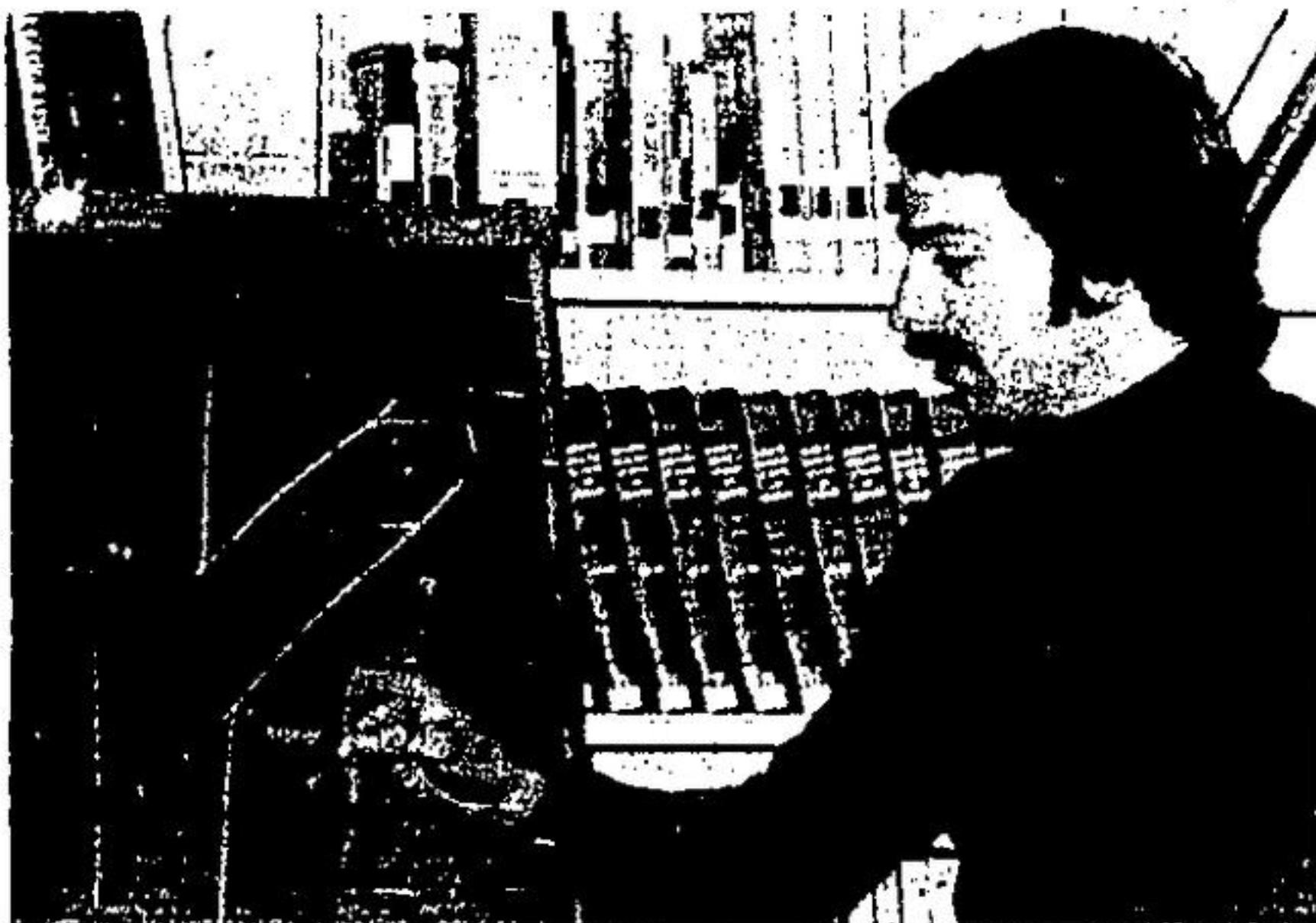
children, grand-children and great-grand-children.

Colin Dickinson, a young man with an agriculture degree from the University of Guelph gave about 25 people tips on how to prune trees, shrubs and roses.
