Some whitefish on Lake Simcoe

There have been periodic catches of whitefish on Lake Simcoe. They have not been coming steady but those that are taken are often of good size. If you have been doing well, please call me and let me know, as I often have a hard time keeping up with the latest news, especially if I am out fishing myself.

When trying the operators mentioned here, please tell them where you heard their name. These folk sometimes call me with news as a way of thanks, and that makes the news fresh from the "operators" mouth so to speak.

I have fished with many of them or have first hand information on their operations from those that have.

Roy Sarasin of the Port Bolster areas runs 18 huts for about 105 anglers. He is located at RR2 Cannington and can be reached at (705) 437-2647 and has been doing quite well this year.

This Saturday should see better weather as the last two or three have been bad for driving.

Therefore the ice hut operators will be booked heavily, so better call them now to reserve your hut for the weekend. On Georgian Bay try Owen Sound with Georgian Bay fish huts.

Call (519) 376-0376 where there are 20 huts to serve you and the fishing ranges from perch all the way up to Rainbow whitefish and splake.

Another excellent product on the market is the Normark Companion Sets. These kits are designed for the Hunter or Fisherman or the Hiker, and contain both a compass and knife.

Buy them as gifts or for your own use, but they are a must for the outdoorsman's shopping list.

The compass is the pin-on-pocket model and the knife is chosen for the use to which it is intended. For example the Fisherman's Companion set contains a pin on compass and a "Presentation" Fillet knife, with leather sheath. The six inch knife is about the best I have ever come across, in fact the best.

COMPASS ESSENTIAL

As I mention frequently here, the compass is an essential for the outdoors person and should be used regardless of ridicule from your friends. When you arrive home and they don't, no more fun and games. In the past I have mentioned the use of Sonar for ice fishing. The recent innovation called Fish Ray now makes it easier to carry a sonar unit on the ice.

It is a hand held unit and is self contained and needs no extra transducer or battery. Twelve inches long and only 1 1/4 pounds, it can be tucked into a pack or even a tackle box.

Simply place the unit in a plastic bag or pail of water and you don't even have to cut the hole to find your fishing spot. Writing spot, don't cut. Simple.

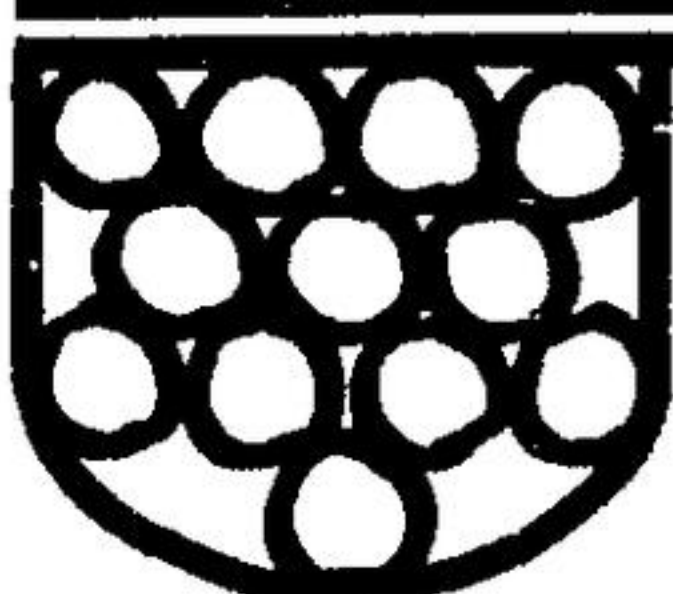
