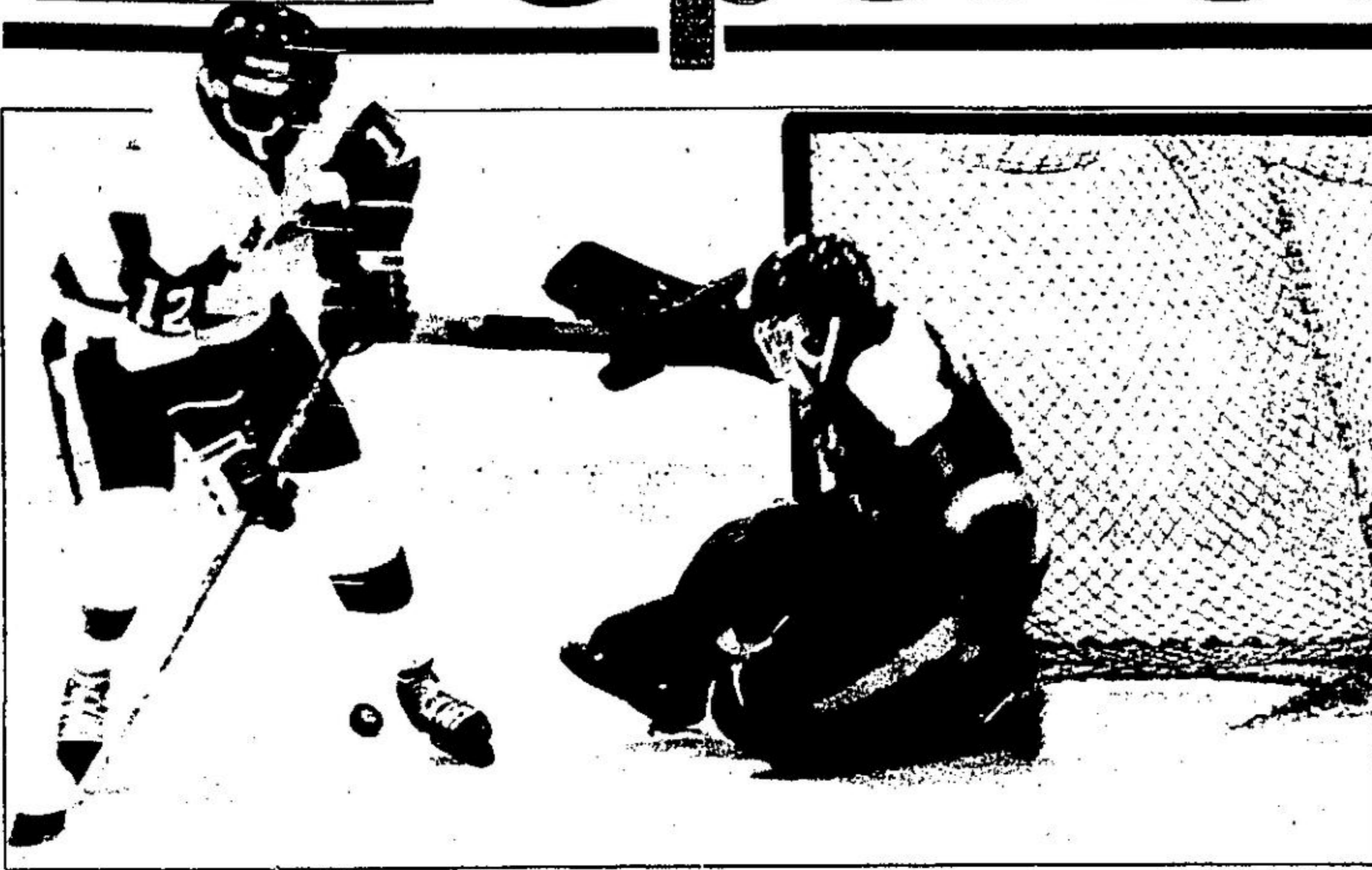

## Raiders latest victim: Midland, 9-1

The Georgetown Chrysler Raiders hockey club continues to overpower recent opposition as Midland became their latest victims in a 9-1 battle last Friday night at Gordon Alcott arena.

All of the Raider forward lines played virtually flawless hockey during the first two periods against the Athletics, dominating the game with superior passing and steady checking.

Raider Joe Ens, who has returned to the Georgetown team after staying away before Christmas, took up the slack of Bill Hamilton who missed the contest. Ens looked dangerous all night and scored three goals.

Newcomer Steve Wicklum had a good night on the scoreboard with two goals. Raider veteran Gary Ford had an excellent night pass-

ing the puck to his teammates and stickhandling around Midland defenders.

It was Ford who set the Raiders with a goal in the first period to start the ball rolling on a shot assisted by John Saunders and Gary Landry.

Joe Ens made the score 2-0 on a shot assisted by Ford on a pass play which pulled the Midland goalie out of position and left Ens in front of the open net with the puck.

Defenceman Gary Landry moved up to the forward line for the game in an effort to give everyone more ice time. His quickness paid off for the team when he walked in from the blue line and scored on a low wrist shot from outside the slot.

## Barber-Johnson attain silver dance medal

Kris Barber of Glen Williams and partner Kelly Johnson placed second at the Canadian figure skating championships last weekend, but their excellent showing won't earn them a space on the Canadian team scheduled to compete at the World Figure Skating championships in March.

Barber, 21, and his ice dance partner Kelly Johnson, 20, of Willowdale skated "exceptionally well", according to their coach Roy Bradshaw of the Toronto Skating and Cricket Club.

However, the team of Robert McCall and Tracy Wilson came up with an equally outstanding dance routine and were perhaps only stronger in their skating, Bradshaw said.

"It was one of the best performances of their lives," Bradshaw said of his star pupils. Kris and Kelly displayed on ice a program that was full in content and up to the standards of their Russian counterparts in detail, Bradshaw said.

### NO BETTER

There wasn't anything the skaters could have done

better, except perhaps a few technical slips of minor nature, he said.

One of the strengths of their opponents, Tracy Wilson and Robert McCall has been Tracy's strong skating, Bradshaw said.

Last year Robert McCall won the Canadian Figure Skating championships with a different partner, Marie McNeil. However, Bradshaw feels the new team of Wilson-McCall is even stronger because Wilson, 20, is a better skater.

Bradshaw thought the marking should have been closer together between Kris and Kelly and their first place opponents. He speculated that maybe a target point spread was tallied for the benefit of international judges who will now see how strong the Canadian dance pairs team is.

The future is still bright for the Barber-Johnson team, says Bradshaw. If McCall and Wilson place within the top ten at the World Figure Skating championships, then two dance pair teams may enter next winter, allowing Kris and Kelly to try again.

Earlier in the week the Gemini were downed 11-4 against the Burlington

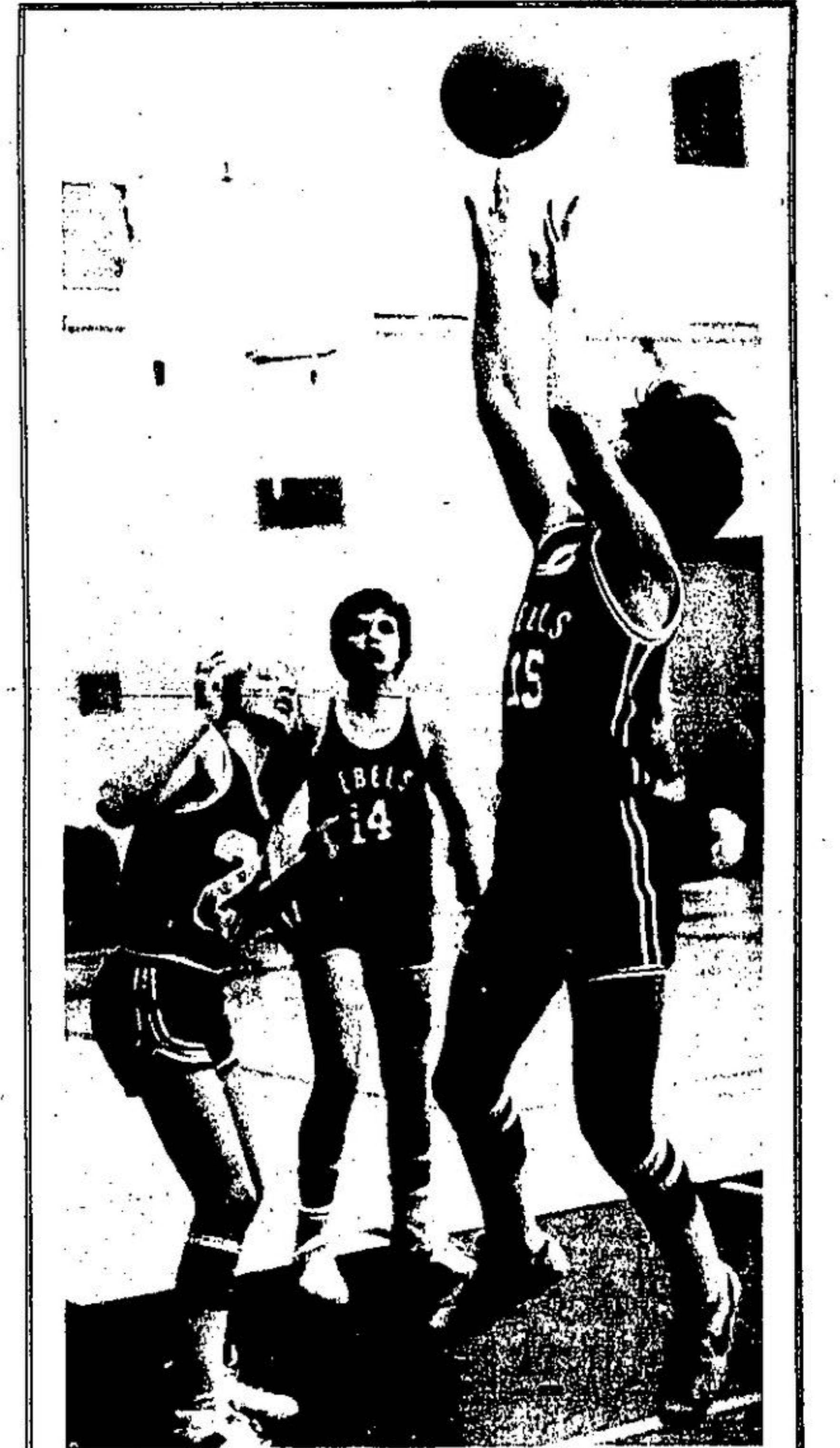
Cougars.
