Holy Cross on the move

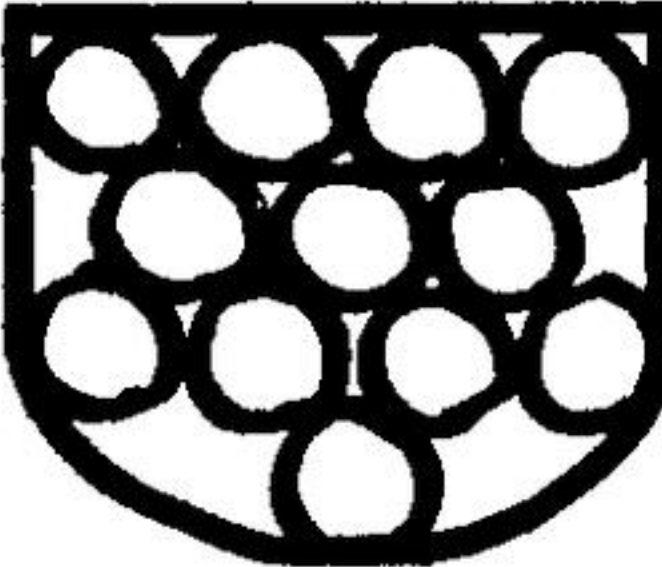
Holy Cross girls basketball team seem destined to repeat the excellent performance of their championship volleyball squad last Fall.
