## Some 'wen do's and don'ts

Don't stick around to say "I'm sorry" after you've kicked yourself free from an attacker, warns Theresa Green, teacher of a system of self defence designed specifically for women. It may sound like unnecess-

ary advice, but Miss Green said that when it comes to self defence, women have a lot of social and cultural conditioning to overcome. "Our backgrounds have

taught us we're feminine and we can't hurt anyone, You don't lose any of your feminine qualities by defending yourself." she said.

The self defence course in "wen do," a technique practised and taught by Miss Green, teaches women awareness. avoidance and reaction to

Speaking to about 40 women in the Centennial School library on Delrex Boulevard. Miss Green said "circularity" distinguishes the wen do technique. Women using it follow the motion of the atack instead of resisting It, and twist their way out of it. The system was developed ten years ago in Toronto and is being taught to women internationally.

"You have to be confident when you're using the techniques. Knowing the moves well means you can use all your strength to make them more effective," Mis Green

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ant when it comes to using wen do. Knowing just a few techniques well and being able to follow them through is much better than being vaguely famlliar with many, Miss Green

Reacting as quickly as possible to an attack lsn't as important as making your reaction effective. It's much better to pause, then use your kick and connect with an opponent's knee than to whip the air in your hurry, she said.

Often an attacker is surprised when a woman fights bazek. He isn't expecting it and that element of surprise works to a woman's advant-

Stressing common sense, wen do seeks to make women aware of their surroundings at "If you're daydreaming, you

can be oblivious to people

coming up behind you or people who are going to attack you," Miss Green said. Attackers are looking for victims who aren't paying attention to their surroundings. Walking self-confidently like someone who knows exactly where they're going makes

women less appealing as a target.
"We don't suggest looking obviously fearful, because this

brings people out in droves to attack you," Miss Green said. Although many women's fashions, from high heels to tight skirts, aren't amenable to fleeing a dangerous situation, one can benefit from what appears to be disadvantagcous, she said. Those high heels can squash the feet of an

"If you have to drop parcels to defend your body, the female instinct is that you drop them gently -- 'Just a minute'. You must learn to just drop them," Miss Green sald while the women laughed. Your attacker isn't going to wait for you to place them down neatly.

If you're out walking a dog,
Miss Green advises you to put

him on a leash. She said even a scruffy chihuahua or poodle on the end of a leash can scare off an attacker, whereas a dog on the loose may be too far away to defend you. "Know your routes; know

which stores are open late and where neighbors and friends live," she advised. Taking a well-lit route and avoiding dark parking lots are common about before stepping out.

sense, but not often thought When walking at night, Miss Green says to avoid hugging the walls of buildings. Walk in the middle of the sidewalk. Besides making you more visible, it means you'll have more time to react if your attacker has to walk out from his storefront cover, and it

gives you more reaction space. If you have to walk past a dark park, cross the street. If you think you're being followed, find out, says Miss Green. Cross the street and if your pursuer does the same, there's a good chance your hunch is right.

Most men walk quicker than women. If you slow down your pace and the fellow behind you does likewise, then there's a good chance he's up to no good, Miss Green said.

Encouraging women to share rides with others, she advised having someone walk you to your car so you won't be alone in the parking lot if a carpool isn't possible.

Park under the lights or close to them and before you climb into your car, check that there's nobody in the back kseat, ....

"Trust your instincts, trust your vibes and follow them." Miss Green stressed. "The biggest mistake that people make is condemning themselves for being aware."

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
