The good ole Royalette days aren't forgotten

Back in the 'ole days of Royalette baseball the girls wore a big "G" on the front of their jerseys, half of the players sported ponytails and they sometimes beat their opponents by 30 points.

The Legion Branch 120 Royalettes started out as a Midget girls team as an extension of Kinamen softball. Ten summers ago coaches Jack Handy and John Danyichuk put together the first girls fastball team to represent Georgetown in the newly formed Halton County league.

Handy, who had been coaching in the Kinsmen league for eight years, remembers that the league was reluctant to allow their better players try out for a 'rep' team, but the idea finally caught on ... and the response was overwhelm-

LARGE TRYOUT

Ninety-six girls from the Kinsmen league tryed out for the first Royalette team in the spring of 1972. Handy and Danylchuk whittled away until 25 girls remained after a week and then final cuts finally lowered the number to a workable figure.

But why start a team to play in neighboring communities? Georgetown had sent down players to various tournaments from the Kinamen league and the girls had been very competitive with other girls' teams.

The idea to start a team to play intercounty became a reality when it was seen that not only were many girls interested, but there were many talented girls available.

One of the first things the newly formed team sought was a sponsor. After the Royal Canadian Legion relinquished their sponsorship of Saturday morning hockey in Georgetown, the girls team approached them to see if they would like to sponsor their team.

With welcome arms the Branch 120 members offered the girls team their support and sponsorship.

Thus, the name Royalette is derived from the 'Royal' in the Royal Canadian Legion. The girls were blue and gold uniforms and played their home games on Friday nights. GOOD SEASON

On September 18, 1972, a future Royalette, Cindy Stafford, pitched her best game of the year for Glen Williams to lead her team to a 10-3 victory over Georgetown in the deciding game of the Halton girls fastball best of three series semi-final.

Nevertheless, the Georgetown Royalettes finished the season as league champions while Glen Williams and Limehouse fought against one another for the playoff finals. After the first successful season, co-coach John Danylchuk moved from Georgetown. Ted Wilkes, a knowledgeable coach from the Kinsmen league, stepped in

to f'll the void. Jack Handy became his manager for the next three years as the girls steadily progressed under the tutelage of Wilkes.

Said Handy: "Ted was coaching in the house league. He was an excellent coach. He really worked with the girls and spent more time with each player individually to work on their weak points."

Handy said Ted had a system and the girls had to stick to it. "He might take a whole practice to perfect one play," Hendy said.

But it was easy to predict the Legion girls would win the All-Ontario Juvenile championships in 1976, Handy said. He could see the improvement of the players over the three year period.

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
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
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
