

Boundary change affects Wrigglesworth, Glen pupils

Howard Wrigglesworth Public School students living in the River Run subdivision above Glen Williams will have a choice in September of going to the Glen public school instead of a boundary change approved by the Halton board of education.

The proposal, made by board administration, affects about 30 children currently attending Wrigglesworth.

In a meeting Jan. 27 for parents of the children, Wrigglesworth principal Tom Gibson explained that the proposed move would be beneficial from a transportation and geographic point of view.

He said students currently attending Wrigglesworth will continue to be bused there free until graduation if they choose to remain.

However, new students from that area will be expected to enroll at the Glen Williams school. Free busing to the Glen will be provided.

Only three parents showed up for the meeting organized by Mr. Gibson. No further meetings are planned. Trustee Betty Fisher said she supports the boundary change because the River Run subdivision is geographically a part of Glen Williams. She said it would keep the Glen school viable.

Mrs. Fisher said brothers and sisters of children already enrolled at Wrigglesworth would be accepted as students there; however, busing for these children could not be guaranteed beyond five years, by which time all current Wrigglesworth students would have graduated.

The Halton board will continue to debate the proposed boundary change at this week's meeting.

Arcade is approved for Acton's outskirts

Halton Hills committee of adjustment granted a minor variance to operators of the Arcade to permit operation of an amusement arcade in a commercial zone on Highway 7 on Acton's eastern outskirts.

However they refused the second part of the application which would have permitted operation of a gas bar on the same premises.

Denis Devine, one of the arcade operators, said he and his partner Mark Edwards are satisfied for now to be permitted to carry on with the arcade which they opened in November.

"As things stand now we can only do one thing," Mr. Devine said. "There are many routes we could follow to try to

change the decision.

"We'd made a presentation and asked that the arcade be restricted because it was causing a problem with Sunday school attendance."

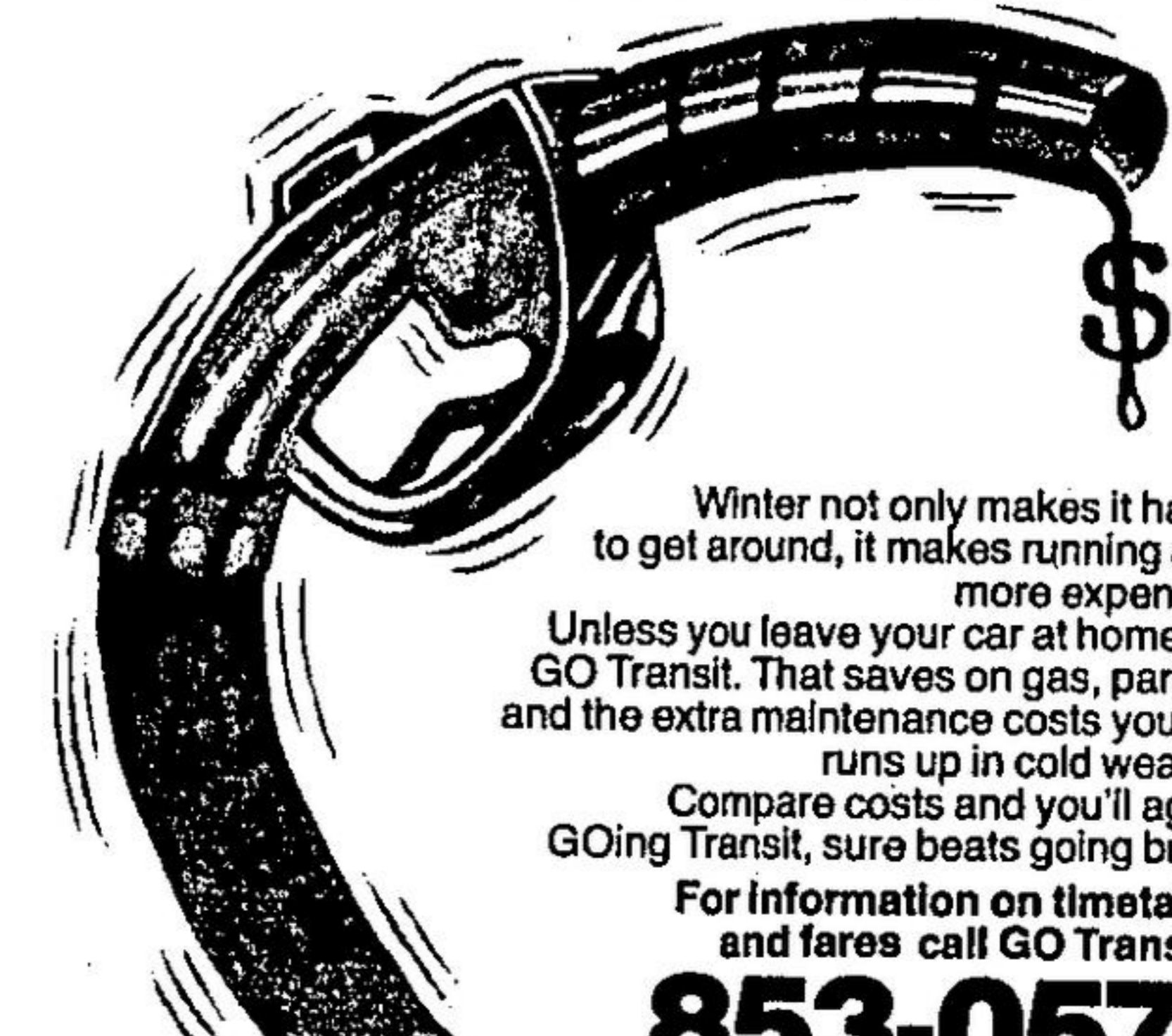
