'Pet-bad' trap

A recent news story from Oakville tells of a German Shepherd dog caught in a leg hold trap. Of course this was another of the "poor pet-had trapper" stories, but several facts were not considered.

Personally I feel sorry for the dog, at least as far as its wounds are concerned. BUT the big unanswered question is, what was the dog doing loose, and in an area where dogs had no business being.

The dog was not licenced, and the owners were being searched for. A timely news release and story by my friend Jack Davis of the Angler and Hunter magazine (both stories written prior to the above noted incident) tell it like it is. Jack brings out the fact that "pets do kill deer" as well as other wildlife.

The Ministry of Natural Resources put out the news release and tells of some of the problems with domestic pets and those released to the wild. Heavy snow falls this winter make it hard for the deer, especially when there is a freezing rain or a warm spell that melts the surface snow with a subsequent freezing.

DEER BREAK The snow crust will support the weight of a dog or wolf but the deer break through and flounder. Even without snow cover, deer can be run to death as a result of depletion of food reserves in the system or even shock.

Ministry personnel have even found raccoons dug out of winter dens and mauled to death by dogs. Local dogs are the culprit here.

It is an offence under the Game and Fish Act in Ontario to allow your dog to run loose in an area that is inhabited by deer.

The maximum fine is \$5,000 (five thousand) and the dog could be killed on sight by a conservation officer. The law states if you live in an area considered rural, it is up to you to prevent your dog from running deer or other wildlife. In other words your dog is not to run at large.

Before you tell me off and say I don't like dogs, know your facts. I love dogs, and would never allow one to run free, that is why I don't

The Knights of Columbus of Halton Hills held their annual "Free Throw" basketball tournament on Sat. Feb. 13 at the Holy Cross School gym.






