Man lives in The Computer Age. He balances bank accounts by computer. He plays games by computer. One day, he may sleep by computer. However, so far, the magnificent machines have found no way to duplicate Guy Lafleur.

Give The Computer credit. It is trying.

It's testing the Guy Lafleurs of the future, through the Challenge of Hockey Skills. More importantly, it's magnifying the awareness of the need for a return to hockey fundamentals. Guy Lasleur thinks so. His son, sixyear-old Martin, is going to be tested as soon as he comes of age, next year.

The Challenge is an awards program developed and promoted by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association to improve a battery of basic skills. Results of six tests, for all participants, are fed into The Computer. In turn, it produces a percentile comparison for each player, in each skill, with his peers across the country.

It's necessary, not to mention mandatory.

"When you see Junior 'A' hockey players," says Howie Mecker, who is among the country's leading tutors, "it's a rarity when you see one who has the 'ability' to play the game properly. We have a country of people who know how to teach kids to play hockey. I'd say less than one per cent of the kids have the 'ability' to skate, to shoot, to give a pass, to make 180-degree turns or to handle a puck."

Meeker believes the Challenge of Hockey Skills is a step in the right direction.

"If I didn't, I wouldn't be involved," he says. "It's a high profile

program. The exposure will get to the parents, and the parents will get to the kids, so that they will get to the coaches. That's the key: the kids asking the coaches."

A simplification of Meeker's own school of testing, the Challenge tests players - ages 7 to 16 - in three skating categories and in puck control with timing drills. For those so inclined. there's an agility test for goaltenders. The analyses zero in on strengths and weaknesses and the comparisons tell the budding Lafleurs which part of their games needs work.

Hockey is, of course, ever ready for any sophisticated approach that improves the game and makes it more fun to play.

"It'll catch on," says CAHA president Murray Costello. "It's not unlike the coaching certificate program. At first, nobody was willing to subject himself to testing. Just by being in Canada, he was automatically qualified to coach. Now, it's a source of pride to have a certificate."

Interest in taking hockey instruction back to the grass roots probably began in 1972, when Team Canada stimulated fans from coast to coast with that unforgettable comeback. Team Canada won, but not with stronger fundamentals than the Soviets, because "heart" isn't listed among the mechanics of playing hoc-

The man who led the return-tothe-basics approach, and who still leads it nine years later, is Mecker.

"All it till is," he says, "is people talking. We have to teach our coaches how to prepare our kids to be taught."

The Eveready-Energizer Challenge of Hockey Skills was conceived with just that in mind. "It has all kinds of potential," says Costello. "It's something that would have been developed by the CAHA over a number of years. With the financial input of a corporate giant like Union Carbide, we can get it off the ground nationally in one season. And with the success of the national junior team.

the timing is just right." Except for Martin Lasleur. He has to wait to turn seven.


