



Seat plaques coming soon - GLT

To the editor of The Herald: To all those who gave so generously to Georgetown Little Theatre's highly successful fund-raising campaign on behalf of the Cultural Centre and who must be wondering: "When are the

seat-plaques going to be installed?" may I please use your columns to assure them:

"Very soon." The plaques have all been engraved and double- and

triple-checked for mistakes. Replacement plaques were engraved before all were

handed over to the town for installation. The decision has finally been made as to exactly where they will be located on the theatre's 287 seats. As a result each plaque has been individually trimmed to fit snugly on the top edge of a seat-back. Larger holes have been drilled to take screws rather than nails in order to discourage little fingers from prying loose what is intended to be fixed permanently.

On behalf of all concerned I would therefore express regret at this latest delay and request the continued understanding of plaque purchasers.

So why the delay? Simply - though perhaps not so simply - because the 534 small brass screws required are still on order. As your readers will no doubt appreciate, it had been Georgetown Little Theatre's
