### Start your tackle repairs

With the Sportmen's Show just around the corner, and the Spring Break from school, many people start thinking about what they will do this summer. This is also the time to start inspecting your tackle to see what you did not get done last fall when you put your tackle away for the winter.

Start that maintenance now and get any repair work done as the repair shops get busy and may not get your work done in time for the season opener. Of course this is the time to investigate new products and innovations in the tackle field. Some I will discuss here and if there is any that you want to know about, don't hesitate to call or write for information.

**NORMARK** Corporation has several new products that were released at the end of the season last year, or more correctly, at the trade show last August. One of these is the new Fish Cleaning Station. This consists of a board with a clip to hold the tail of the fish to be cleaned and a hole into which a plastic bag can be secured to take waste. Portable, it can be used at the cottage, home or in the boat.

Personally, I feel that every fisherman should have one of these Normark fish cleaning stations if he intends to clean his fish on site.

#### MR. DIAWA

O.K., so I am often called Mr. Diawa. That is because I use a Diawa Millionaire casting reel, and am somewhat addicted to its use. However, that is going to change. The new Diawa MAGFORCE reels are the thing of the future, now.

These reels incorporate new technology in the field of fishing tackle research. The backlash is now obsolete - or nearly so. Magforce has a new magnetic spool control that can be adjusted for the beginner or the expert and those who would not buy a casting reel due to a fear of backlash now has no excuse not to try one.

With my older type of casting reel, even the adjustable Diawa Millionaire, I would sometimes hit a tidal wave that would spring up between me and the target stump. I always considered myself an expert at untangling backlashes.

People used to give me their backlash to untangle, but eventually pride in my accomplishments gave way to a desire to spend more time fishing. Now with the new Diawa Magforce reels, I should have that time. I am looking forward to seeing one at the Sportmen's Show on March 19th.

The model PMF 1000 carries 125 yards of 10 pound test line and the wider spool PMF 1500 takes 140 yards making it an ideal reel for the salmon fishing in the great lakes. Both have 4.7 lb 1 retrieve ratios, sealed stainless steel ball bearings, and permit use of line as light as six pound test.

## Dave Bootle returns to pace GDHS gymnastics team

The GDHS boys' gymnastics team opened their '82 season last Tuesday at the Red and White Invitational gymnastics meet, in which the senior team placed second and the juniors fourth.

Dave Bootle, returning to the team, set the pace for the seniors by winning the

senior all-round, with 53.85 of a possible sixty points. His nearest competition was 1.85 points behind him.

Bootle placed in five of six events with firsts on the parallel bars, side horse, and rings, with scores of 8.65, 9.45, and 9.45 respectively. He also placed third in the vault and horizontal bars, and fourth on the floor.

John Thorpe placed second on the parallel bars with a score of 8.6 and earned 44.65 points in the all-round, but did not place. Duane Wilson also earned 41.05 points in the all-round.

For the juniors James Orwin and Kevin Kotani earned 41.95 and 39.0 all-round points, but did not place in the top five. The seniors placed 18.56 points ahead of

Algonquin, rivals from last year's OFSAA championships, but were eleven points out of first place to Highlands, the host school. Coach Kotani said that since it is early in the season those eleven points can be easily overcome by the end of the season.

The juniors placed fourth with 124.15 points, and Highlands won with 145.3 team points.
