- General Criteria for All Nominations

  2. Individuals and groups who have previously received this award, should have improved upon their level of excellence to become eligible in ensuing years.
  3. All nominations will be presented to the selection committee for final approval.

Special Criteria for All Nominations

1. An individual's or group's achievement in cultural, creative or performing arts.
2. Individuals or groups who have achieved Provincial, National or International acclaim or awards for their endeavours or achievements in the cultural, creative or performing arts.
3. Individuals or group's award for outstanding community service in culture and/or recreation.
4. Criteria - Individuals or groups who have volunteered their time on a continuous basis and provided an outstanding contribution to the field of culture and/or recreation in the Town of Halton Hills, as determined by the selection committee.
5. An individual's achievement in sports.
6. Criteria - Individuals or groups who have achieved recognition in Provincial, National or International championships, as recognized by the Sport Governing body, or awards for his/her achievements in the sports field; Individual athletes must be residents of the Town of Halton Hills at the time of their award or achievements.
7. A group's achievement in sports.

## Gerry's winning smile... and tough guy image

Known for his winning smile as seen on page one of this week's sports edition, current Halton coach Gerry Inglis was often known for some other aspects when he played hockey.

When looking at past stories when Gerry Inglis was a player with his brother Blake, certain paragraphs about the Raider mentor truly identify the meaning of a "scrapbook".

Our files tell the story of Inglis as a player who played the game tough.

"On Friday night the Raiders suffered a serious blow in losing a 6-3 decision to Orillia (circa 1957). In the third period Gerry Inglis crashed hard into the end boards. At first it was feared that his leg might be broken, but luckily it turned out to be a severe sprain.

He will likely be out of action for a month or so. Gerry will be badly missed as he is one of the finest blockers in the league."

In the 1957-58 season the story went like this, "Fred Lawrence who held Georgetown together more than once throughout the course of the game got his best protection from Gerry Inglis and Columbia Lou Fawcette."

Nevertheless, lest we forget, Gerry was an aggressive puck carrier when called upon as seen here in 1959: "Gerry Inglis returned to his rushing form and scored Georgetown's second goal when he was prompted to carry the puck after a series of inept thrusts by the forwards that fizzled around the Port Credit blueline."

In 1962 Gerry was still known as a tough one on the ice - especially when his brother was downed by a Guelph player who slashed him: "Gerry Inglis, brother of the felled Raider, made a beeline for the Guelph bench, and after a few threatening gestures referee Al Promane ejected both players."

Inglis, however instead of going to the Raider dressing room and intent on equaling the score, made a left turn at the exit and attempted to get at Fargy."

## Novice 2s win

Georgetown Chrysler Tier 2 novices travelled to Milton this weekend and scored a 5-3 victory to bring their season standing of two wins each.

Milton opened the scoring at 6:49 in the first period with Georgetown tying the score with a goal by Jay Kerlake assisted by Jeff Timmons and moving to the lead less than a minute later on a goal by Craig Juby again assisted by Jeff Timmons. The period ended with Milton getting the

The National Championship continues to elude Cornwell whose drive for the number one plate fouled at Halleybury Feb. 7 when his open class bike seized a rod bearing, eliminating him from contention.

Two other Georgetown riders put together good performances at Orangeville. Mike Doucette, a relative newcomer, who is being coached by Cornwell appears certain to take the Ontario High Point award for the lightweight junior class having posted another class win

at Orangeville, a first place at Port Perry and a third place at Halleybury.

Dave Broomhead, competing in the senior class took fourth place in the lightweight race. Broomhead has also been riding with the help of the Cornwell Racing Group and is making steady progress through the ranks.

Jon will be taking the lightweight machine he has been ice racing, a potent 250

RM Suzuki, owned and tuned by Len Shepley of Milton, to the Florida Series where he hopes to sharpen his short track skills in preparation for the regular season.

The regular dirt track season will begin in late April and Jon intends to compete in as many AMA races as he can reach as well as mounting another assault on the Canadian National Championship.
