
Marjorie Ostrander, Student Assistant, spoke on "Promises". Promises are

MODSE JAW -- On Christmas Eve 1930 a young member of the Moose Jaw troop in Saskatchewan, after the troop thought all the needy children in the city and area had been looked after, found out there was a farm south of the city where there would be disappointed children on Christmas Day.

Scout Reggie Porter procured a bundle of toys and set out on foot for the farm.

It was a bitter night and his hands and feet were so painfully frostbitten that he was confined to his home for several weeks afterwards.

Near the end of January the father of the family where he had played Santa Claus visited Reggie, bringing him a white pony. Scout Porter then joined the Moose Jaw Mounter Troop.
