Lost identity

To the editor of The Herald:
Dear Sir:
Because of this bylaw 82-5, bringing in street names we are losing our rural identity and can suffer immensely by a change in our assessment for taxation as a rural area.

Is Bolton not included in this bylaw? Queen Street no longer exists if this bylaw is not rescinded.

The new numbering plan accepted by council eliminates the present property numbers on King and Queen Streets, and on all roads included in the bylaw.

The new locations caused by this bylaw are what the PEOPLE have not accepted from the beginning.

We need a referendum before any such bylaw should be forced on taxpayers and residents who have objected

strongly against it. From the richest to the poorest, from the youngest to the oldest, from the newest to the longest residents, taxpayers and their families have always been in opposition to this new scheme.

The bylaw states: "Whereas it is deemed desirable in the interest of public convenience". The taxpayers and their families are the public who objected because this is strictly "inconvenience" to say the least.

Why has the signatures of over 500 taxpayers up until now have been ignored by the majority of council members?

Why were the PEOPLE and their objections Jan. 11 not enough to stop this bylaw from being passed?

I object as I find the proposed by-law to be a moral, legal and financial pressure forced upon me, with no strong positive logic, against my will.

How will our land titled deed be affected? How will mail get to rural folk? Every car owner and holder of a driver permit, by law, is liable to charges if change in address go unreported, within five days. How important is this contentious item to Caledon?

Even half the money, projected to implementing the change, spent on an emergency-assist code system whereby a sticker placed on every phone in the area, keyed to a coded map in police offices, fire halls and ambulance centres could resolve 95 per cent of this dilemma.

To the editor of The Herald:
This hopefully is my last plea to the taxpayers of the Town of Caledon to ask their councillor to rescind the remaining of our rural roads bylaw.

The last vote, recorded Feb. 8, was 8-4 against rescinding it. Three of our rural councillors, Currie, Kolb and Glassford and our Caledon East councillor Cannon, who lives in rural Caledon voted yes. Mayor Clarkson, the two rural Chingiacousy councillors, Hunter and Pallett, the two Bolton councillors MCereay and Wright and Gould of Inglewood voted no.

The other two live in rural Chingiacousy adjacent to the City of Brampton. The other three councillors who voted to re-name our lines and sidewalks live in Bolton and Inglewood and reside on streets with names that won't be changed. I have a gut feeling that the mayor, who lives in rural Caledon would like to have the bylaw rescinded.

The two Bolton councillors whose constituencies won't be offended are preventing the bylaw from being cancelled. Please, gentlemen: annul the bylaw March 8.
