

'Top calibre' teams, local M & M Pro Sports vie for Bantam trophy

With the schedule finalized for the 22nd annual Georgetown International Bantam tournament, much of the paperwork has been completed by tournament co-chairman Al Martin and Howard Murphy.

From March 20 to March 26 teams from all over Ontario and three teams from Detroit will compete in the two games-total goals elimination rounds. Then on March 26 and

March 27, winners of the four divisions will play their semi-final matches until the championship playdowns are held March 27. Georgetown's M and M Pro Sports Bantams will be

representing our town in the tournament. Many of the players on the M and M team have Bantam tournament experience because they played last year as Minor Bantams.

Under the coach-manager team of Junior Tibbitts and Norm Lockhurst, the Minor Bantams last year beat Stouffville 3-2. Stouffville later made it to the C division final. Tibbitts and Lockhurst are now with the M and M Pro Sport Bantams.

During the regular season, the Georgetown Bantams only lost one game, but they faltered in the zone play-off elimination series. Karen Harrison, former Georgetown Citizen of the Year has been the billeting chairperson for the past three years. The Lions often

refer to Harrison as the unsung hero of the Bantam tournament. Anyone willing to help with the billeting may call Mrs. Harrison at 877-3922. Although there are 10 teams less than last year's tournament, chairman Al Martin says all the teams are of major calibre so every game should be good to watch, he said.

Much of the tournament organizing has to do with sending out invitations to various hockey centres, Martin said. It's a matter of finding out who is involved with hockey in the town and letting them know Georgetown is inviting them to take part in their tournament, he said.

Martin said, "I must have called every city in Ontario." Referees, rink rats who look after the game sheets and the ice, plus girls who man the ticket windows will all be active at the tournament as volunteers. Martin himself has offered his time to the Bantam tournament for four years.
