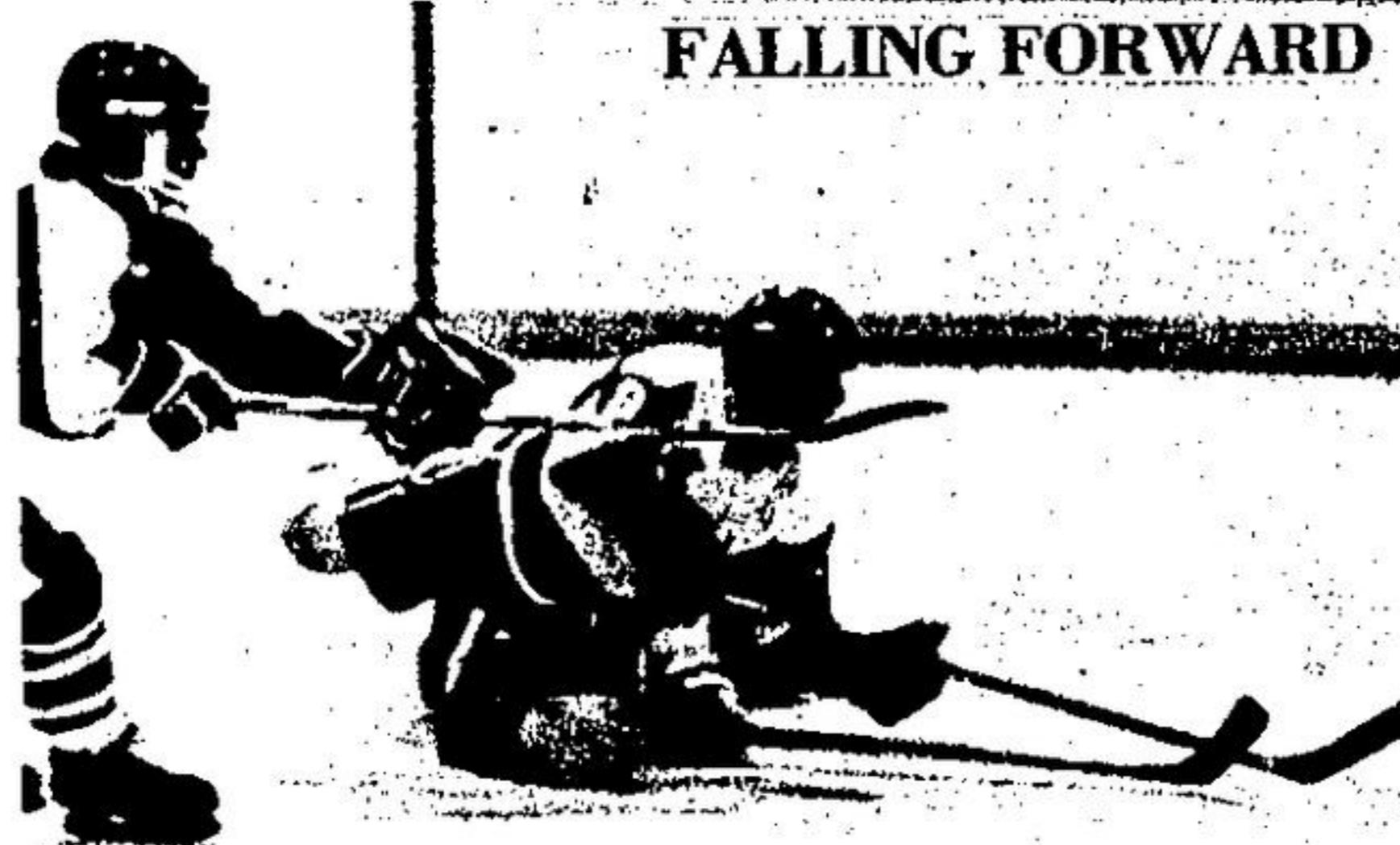

# Denmark's first chance at hosting world's best

Although this is the first time Denmark has been host to a World Figure Skating Championship, the history of the global skating awards has generally been confined to the "winter" nations of the northern hemisphere.

The International Skating Union staged its first championships — a one-day affair — in St. Petersburg (now Leningrad), Russia, on Feb. 9, 1896. From that day until 1930, the site of the competition was seldom anywhere but St. Petersburg, Davos, Vienna, Stockholm, Oslo, Berlin or London.

The Northern European domination of the championship venue is one reason few North Americans took part in the first 30 years of competition. In 1930, the ISU — recognizing the growth of the sport in North America — awarded the championships to New York City and Americans became enchanted with the likes of legendary ladies champion Sonja Henie and men's titlist Karl Schäfer.

Although women had been competing at the championships since 1906, it was only in 1924 that they were officially recognized as world champions. Before that, the female titlist was called merely ISU champion.

**NORSE BEAUTY**  
When the women's gold medal was renamed the world championship in 1924, Herma Plan-Szabo of Austria was in the last three years of her reign as Queen of the Ice world. She handed the crown over to that stunning and graceful Norse beauty Sonja Henie.

Henie won her first title in 1927 in her home country and won the championship the next nine years. She set a new standard for skating and lifted it into the international limelight on the strength of her captivating routines and Hollywood movies.

Earlier, another name synonymous with skating — Ulrich Salchow — had held court as men's king for 10 of 11 years from 1902. The

Swede so dominate the form and substance of the skating of his day that a jump was named after him.

Pairs had been added to the ISU slate in Czechoslovakia in 1908 and, along with the women's event, became bona fide world championships in 1924.

Canada first hosted the world championships in 1932 in Montreal. Sonja Henie was in her prime and Austria's Schäfer won his third of seven successive championships. Canada has been the site only three times since then — Vancouver (1906), Calgary (1972) and Ottawa (1978).

The championships return in 1984 when the world competition will be held in Ottawa, although the Olympics of that year are to be staged at Sarejevo, Yugoslavia.

As the world champions

hips matured and more countries sent stronger, better prepared skaters, dynasties of skating became shorter.

**BIG LURE**  
Part of the reason for this was the lure of professional skating. Figure skating is an expensive sport and with ice shows popping up in the late 1940s and 1950s to take advantage of the public's appetite for good free-skating (with no burdensome and boring figures), financial rewards were held out to top-flight skaters if they'd relinquish their amateur status.

When ice dancing was introduced to the official world championships at Paris in 1952, Jean Westwood and Lawrence Demmy established a stranglehold on the title that Great Britain held until 1962.

In fact, the dancing title has never gone to a couple from any country outside of Great Britain or the Soviet Bloc. The U.S.S.R. had won 11 straight titles until it was dethroned by Jayne Torvill and Christopher Dean last year.

**LONG REIGN**  
The other monopoly on the gold medals has come in the pairs, where for the past 17 years, only the U.S.A.'s Babi Ionia and Randy Gardner (Vienna, 1979) have been able to break the Soviet domination.

Ludmila Belousova and Oleg Protopopov won three titles, beginning in 1966, then fellow countrymen Alexei Ulanov and the incomparable Irina Rodina won four titles before Rodina switched to partner (and future husband) Alexander Zaitsev for six more goals.
