Soccer won't cancel, but meeting with town continues

Youth registration took place on Saturday at Zellers Sports Section. The error by one paper in our 'ad', coupled with the furor and controversy over the user charges kept registrations to just over 300 for the first day. We shall be there this Saturday from 9:30 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. for the second session.

The girls provided almost 33 per cent of those on Saturday and there was a distinct lack of 'rep' players from mosquito upwards in age groups.

The general consensus following Thursday's meeting is that there will be soccer for our kids this year. Already some concessions have been made, or suggested, by the Rec (or is the correct spelling Wreck) Director Tom Shepard. According to Tom it is Council which is pressing for the 1,069.575 per cent increase in youth fees for the use of fields, some of which are non-existent or unusable. According to some councillors, council had no knowledge of the proposals for 1982, at least prior to last Monday. A slight discrepancy there, methinks.

The meeting was extremely well presented, very slick, at the speed of the rat-at-at of a sub machine gun. The presentation included some inaccuracies, as, for example, three fields at Yoder.

The dept stated they did not know the number of fields as they had not examined the (one) field, yet they managed to list this - and other fields, including those which are not considered safe for use, and therefore unused by us. There was also a grading of fields - the grading carried out by the dept which admitted it had not examined the fields.

A financial comparison was handed out prior to the meeting, a comparison which is much invalid, being based on proposed 1982 work versus only the fees received from 1981 use. No mention of the income from all other sources! No mention of the actual costs in 1981.

No mention of the transfer of some \$10,000 from the field maintenance budget to another area in 1981! This alone would have taken care of the great increase being proposed for 1982 and left a few thousand over.

Of course costs are going up, and as Tom pointed out, departmental costs also. These have to be recovered from somewhere. He firmly believes in the user fee principle. That is, department provides and the users pay "something" towards the costs of maintenance. This has a seductive logic, which if extended to the next logical conclusion, means that non-use of a facility should mean a credit on your property taxes. In other words pay for use, receive for non-use!

The provision of fields has been a priority item in my book, and in Tom Shepard's from my experience. He has attempted to provide without any luck. Actually, I have often stated that mending the fields we do have would probably be sufficient. There seems to be some reluctance to pursue this suggestion, and I know not why, someone else may.

The Neilson-Dorsey fields are going ahead and it must be remembered that these are not permanent, although very welcome indeed for however long we have the use.

The seniors and youths combined to make their presence felt in a calm and reasonable manner, which certainly had the dept members a little surprised.

considering some of those in the audience. The soccer group stated they wished time to consider the proposals, and invited the Rec Director to the next Youth executive, I understand he accepted and that meeting was yesterday evening.

I have not made a full report here (space you know), suffice to say the youth and senior groups believe that their statements and case have been heard and hopefully some good will come out of this further stage in the proceedings. Watch this space! And, register the kids. The rep players had better get their skates on and register. There will be soccer.
