Bum check deal for laid-off employees?

To the editor of The Herald:
Most of the staff from Delta-crafts Manufacturing Ltd. were let go with no notice from work Feb. 22 on a supposed lay-off. On the following morning, Feb. 23, the place went into receivership and the remaining staff were asked to stay on working for the receiver (Arthur Anderson Inc.).

During the next week the laid-off employees received their previous weeks' paycheques back N.S.F. and were also told that their holiday pay, the week's pay they hold back when they joined Delta-crafts Mfg. Ltd. and any severance pay coming to them would not be paid until after the Bank of Montreal, being the preferred creditor, got their money. The employees that remained working for Arthur Anderson Inc. were reimbursed for their N.S.F. cheques, but were also told that they come second in line to any money due to them.

We would just like it to be known we feel we have been used unjustly and would like it brought to the attention of the public. If it is possible for the banks to step in and not pay any back pay or holiday pay with the profits they have enjoyed this past year, then it's time for the ordinary working person to speak up and fight for him or herself, whatever the case may be. Some of the employees from Delta-crafts were faithful for over 17 years and are left out in the cold with nothing to fall back on, but the banks expect them to put up the money for the N.S.F. cheques or they just take it out of your account, even though they didn't know they would bounce.

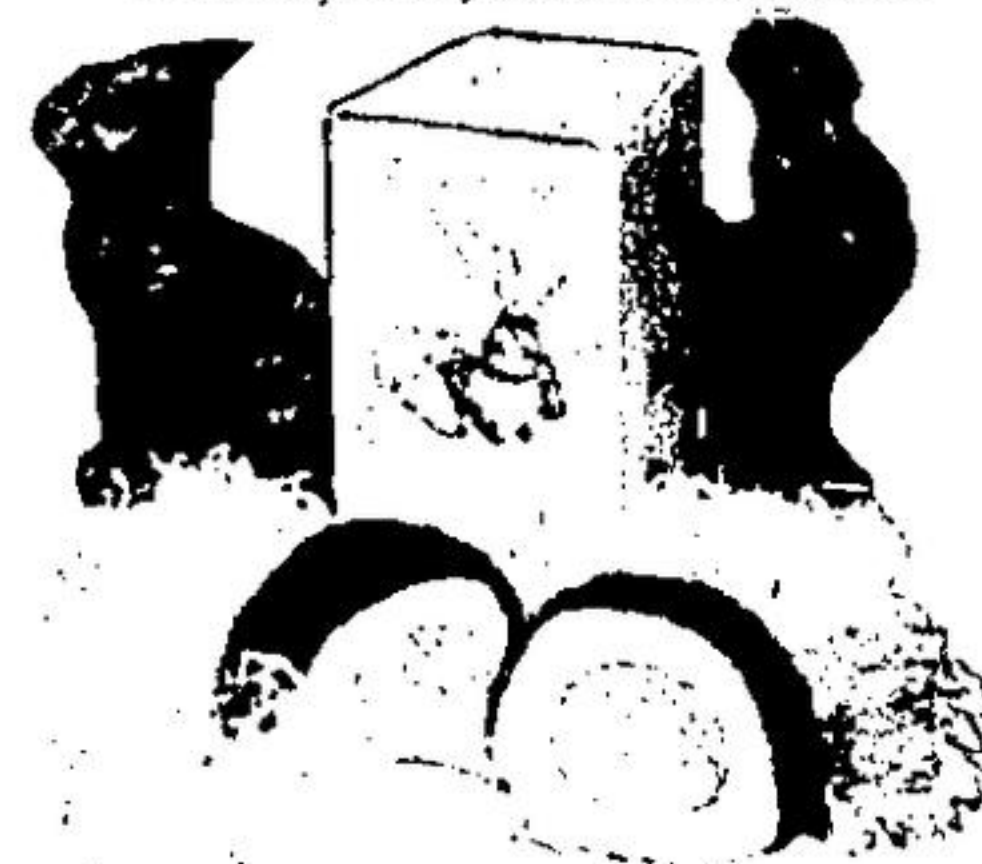
