As Central Ontario Champions, this bantam girls' team, led by coach Shirley Chaplin, defeated the teams from 17 other zones to capture the Provincial Championship in the VBC '84 Steps-to-Stardom in which over 32,000 Ontario youth began competing since last January.

Arriving back at their home lanes in "G.T.", they were greeted and cheered by more than 150 friends, parents and bowlers as they

carried in the championship banner while wearing their new gold medals.

The girls, Michelle Webster, Toni Clements, Leanne Burt, Valerie Sabo and Lisa Brading never relinquished their lead throughout the contest, rolling 2591-550 pins better than their combined average.

After the 1st game Georgetown led Newmarket by 59 pins. After the second the lead dropped down to 9 pins. But, in the 3rd game they again pulled ahead by 60. These local young medalists are now anxiously awaiting their flight to Saskatoon to vie for the Canadian Championship medals in the begin-

ning of May against the other provinces.

The Georgetown boys' team with 2365, although also bowling over their own average, came in 6th place to the winners from Whitby and their 2596. This fine effort came from Brian Bell, Eddie Doyle, Christopher Somers, Michael Larocque and Ian Vint with Ralph Miller as coach.

The junior girls' team of Cherie McElroy, Tracie Peggie, Karen Doyle, Lynn Norton and Judy Carroll were coached by Andy Parent. Their score of 2722 netted them 9th place behind the winners from Parkway, Scarborough, with 3415.

Locals in Minor Track championship

On Saturday, March 20 some rookie members of the Cardinal Leger Track team took part in the 1982 Minor Indoor Track and Field Championships, held at York University.

Melissa Morey is the Atom Ontario Champion in the 1500 m race, running approximately a 5.40 for the distance.

Jeannette Clarke placed seventh out of the nine runners with a time of 6.54.

The race was run an extra lap, due to an oversight and their official times for a 1700 m distance (100 m more than a mile) were 6.29 and 7.22 respectively. These two girls are both 11 years old and attend St. Francis of Assisi School.

In the Bantam division (12 and 13 year olds) Charlene van Cleef placed a respectable 18th out of 40 in the 800 m event with a time of 2:44.2. The winning time was 2:17.2. A new Ontario record, so the field was quite strong.

For the boys Sean Cleary placed fourth in the 800 m

event with a time of 2:24.4 which was a personal best while brother Brendan came in 18th with a 2:41.0 and Greg Clarke placed 29th with a 2:54.3.

In the 50 m sprint Robbie Morris placed well in his heat and advanced to the semi-finals. He ran a 7.0 to be put out of the finals by one tenth

of a second and ending up 7th overall out of an original 36 runners.

All the Bantams come from Holy Cross School. Coach John Luciani was quite pleased with all the results especially on such little preparation. He is looking forward to a very promising outdoor season.
