

One of Canada's most unusual artists unveils his current obsession at Georgetown's Gallery House Sol this Saturday, and the world of orchids may never be the

Gerard Brender a Brandis of Carlisle, who immigrated to Canada with his Dutch parents in 1947, has been coming to terms with what he calls "Orchid Fever" by depicting the flower in a multitude of formats.

A collection of his draw-

ings, watercolors and wood engravings goes on display this Saturday at House Sol along with designs in wood by Ted Hodgetts and ceramics by Jane Wilson. The

show continues until April 22. Born in 1942, Mr. Brender a Brandis graduated from Mc-Master University with a BA in art history in 1965, and established his own studio in Carlisle. Known as Brandstead Press, the studio gives its founder every opportunity to develop his many talents in a variety of media. Calling

himself a "Bookwright", Mr. Brender a Brandis produces limited edition books by making the paper himself. setting the type, creating the illustrations, binding the books and finally publishing




