## Scouts say: Thunder Bay isn't as strong as Timmins

Scouting reports brought back from Thunder Bay by Georgetown Chrysler Raider coach Gerry Inglis and general manager Dave Kentner after watching last Monday night's game seem to indicate the Raiders won't be faced with nearly a strong challenge as the Timmins team.

Kentner and Inglis watched the Thunder Bay Blazers down the El Monte Centennials 5-1 in apparently easy fashion.

Says Kentner, "Ottawa was badly outplayed by Thunder Bay. The Blazers were playing at the level of

their competition." Part of the problem with Ottawa was that some of their players had to go back to work and couldn't stay for the Monday game, Kentner says.

What Georgetown fans might be wanting to hear, though, is that the Georgetown GM suggests the Raiders can and will beat the Thunder Bay team.

"I'm confident that there will be competition in Georgetown after the Thunder Bay series," Kentner told the Herald Wednesday afternoon.

If Georgetown wins, they

will host the Eastern Canadian Intermediate A championships April 9.

Thunder Bay are not a physical team, but they play their position very well, the Raider general manager says.

Meanwhile, it was discussed after the Raiders' OHA championship win Sunday as to whether or not a team from Quebec should be given a chance to challenge Georgetown for the Hardy Cup preliminary playoff round even though their entry is not sanctioned by the OHA.



The Rouyn team from Quebec, 100 miles east of Timmins defeated Timmins in the NOHA playoffs, but were considered not eligible to perform in further Hardy Cup playoffs because they applied too late in the season, schedules for the playoffs had already been drawn up.

The Georgetown Raiders decided not to allow the Rouyn team to play them for Cup competition.



## Game by game review

**SATURDAY NIGHT**  
 Georgetown scored the first goal against Timmins in the second game of the series. Hamilton deflected a high wrist shot by Peter Sturgeon from the face off in the first minute of play.

Quick reflexes and thinking by Ray Tonelli resulted in the Raiders' second goal as Sturgeon passed the puck from around the net in a shorthanded effort. Tonelli then tucked the puck behind a surprised Timmins net-minder from behind the net.

Mike Rainville passed across the goalmouth to a waiting Mike Penasse who scored the goal.

Raiders in the third period got more scoring chances than Timmins, but a hot Bill Hughes from the North Stars kept the Raiders at bay.

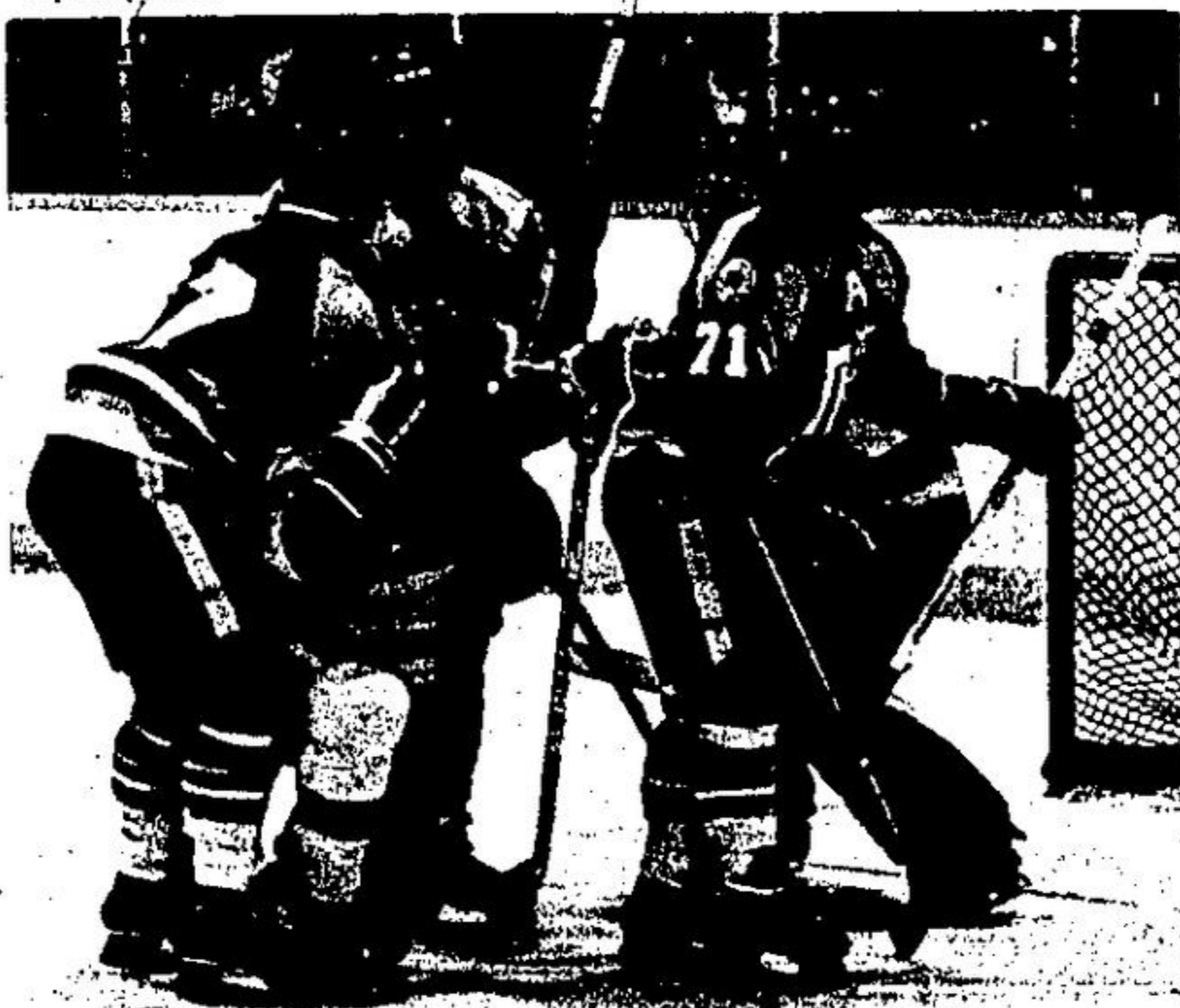
