New challenges in Wilde's classic play

When the curtain rises April 30 on Georgetown Little Theatre's production of Oscar Wilde's "The Importance of Being Earnest", director Derek Joynes will probably feel like a father watching his daughter head off on her first date.

The opening performance will carry, for the cast and every GLT member, more than the usual stage jitters. Itmarks the first time GLT has produced a play, complete with elaborate set changes, with the spacious John Elliott Theatre stage in mind.

Among the best comedies ever written in English literature, "Earnest" demands flawlesaness. It's a light, witty play meant to roll on well-oiled theatrical ball bearings; any bumps would surely jar the audience back into the dreary spring of 1981 after enjoying moments suspended in time with some rather whimsleal members of late 19th century British "haute couture".

Certainly a large share of the responsibility for maintaining the play's intended comic momentum will rest with the cast; but to ensure that the visual effects are literally seamless, GLT has taken advantage of a special theatre grant and commissioned a professional stage designer for a few weekends of instruction.

For the last two weekends and next Saturday and Sunday as well, David Antscherl is joining GLT's backstage crew and cast members at Sacre Coeur Church hall, offering advice which will be used over and over again on how to properly build stage sets for areas as large as the Elliott Theatre stage.

Thanks to his instruction, GLT will be able to transform the stage three times during the play, moving the audience from a London apartment after the first act to the luxurious garden of an English country house and finally into the same house's drawing

"Visually, it should be an excellent production," produc-er Jo Heed told The Herald Monday. "Mr. Antscherl has given superb detailed drawings for us to follow as we construct the sets. This enables us to build up a good stock of flats and windows (which can be used in future productions)."

TAKES PLACE

Mrs. Heed added that Mr. Antacher! has studied the period in which the play takes place-just before the end of the 19th century-and using Wilde's development of character, tries to imagine what sort of environment Algernon Moncrieff and John

Worthington would live in. "From the actors' point of view, they love it," Mrs. Heed said. "It's definitely a new approach for, us. When we were based in Wrigglesworth School or Sacre Coeur, we could go in and build a set, add furnishings and leave them there. Now, we have to prefabricate everything-it all has to be lightweight so that we can take it apart and move it to the theatre before the perform-

Previous GLT plays at the theatre - "Not Now, Darling", the annual Christmas feature and most recently "Our Town", - have relled on frugal sets and backdrops. For the first time at the theatre, GLT will use no less than three sets, one for each act, comprising 60

Critics have described the play as "flawless" from a literary point of view. The self-contained vacuum in which the characters live allows them a child-like innocence; there are no dark recesses in the play behind which evit can lurk to mark the lives of the characters.

Not surprisingly, in the innocence of the play, the love interest is far from serious. It's a whimsical, spur of the moment, struck-by-Cupid'sarrow type of emotion.

John Worthington and Algernon Moncrieff are the gentlemen of stature who, like a pair of teenagers, respectively fall in love with Gwendolyn Fairfax and Cecily Cardew. Their inventiveness (Worthington has a factitious brother and Moncrieff tells lies about an ailing friend) provides them with something to do and talk about later over tea and cucumber sandwiches.

LOVEFLIRTING Both of them love flirting with "danger" or the chance that their little ruses will be uncovered. Sure enough, their inventiveness, put to use in the pursuit of love, does wind them up in a "scrape" and on the wrong side of the law which, in this microcosm, happens to be the aristocratic hawk, Lady Bracknell.

The play's sniffy dialogue guarantees lots of good belly laughs as the characters plunge headlong into comic chaos, surfacing innocently enough in an elaborate denoue-
