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## Raiders face biggest challenge against Cap Pele tonight



Last weekend the Georgetown Chrysler Raiders capped a three game sweep of their Intermediate A series with the Thunder Bay Blasters with a 4-1 victory. The other two games were 7-1 and 11-2 wins for Georgetown. The Raiders advanced as All-Ontario champions and now host the Eastern Canadian finals against Cap Pele.

New Brunswick, Cap Pele is located about 40 miles from Moncton. The Cap Pele Capitals won their Eastern Canadian semi-final in three straight games over St. John's Newfoundland, winning the final game Sunday 11-2. Caps won the other two 7-6 and 6-5. Western teams still alive on the Hardy Cup

Intermediate trail are Quesnel Kangaroos and the North End Flyers from Winnipeg. Assessing the Cap Pele Capitals, Georgetown general manager Dave Kentner says his team will be facing a very fast-skating, disciplined hockey club that play defensive hockey in their own end compared to the offensive-

minded Georgetown rear-guards. From the reports Kentner has heard, the Capitals have perhaps two lines who do

most of the scoring, but Georgetown, he counters, has three lines that do the scoring. Goaltending seems to be a strength for the Capitals who have Yves Belanger, a veteran of the Central and American leagues. Scott Grady and Bob Warner for Cap Pele played for Canada's national team in 1976-77 season, the same year Georgetown Raider Gary McFadyen entered the Leaf organization.

### Terriers folding?

The Orillia Terriers Intermediate A franchise is in danger of folding as president George Maconachie announced to his publicist Paul Rimstead that a \$23,000 debt is just too much for him to handle. Maconachie is quoted as saying, "If somebody else wants to run the team they can if they assume our debts."

The newly formed Junior A Orillia Travelways offered to pay the Terrier debt if Maconachie would join their organization. The Orillia Terriers as a senior club won the Allan Cup in 1973 to become Canadian champions at that level of hockey. Three years ago because of travelling costs, the Orillia team moved from senior hockey to intermediate hockey. Maconachie has been running the club for seven years.
