Following this everyone enjoyed breakfast at the church, after which the regular Easter church service with all three choirs taking part, gave added enjoyment to the service.

Rodney and Leanne Wilson, grandchildren of Spence and Kay Wilson and former area residents, have been back in Brampton for the past week, entertaining Inuit school children from Arctic Bay on Baffin Island. This is the most northerly point on the island and is opposite the North West Passage.

Our young people, 15 altogether, flew up by way of Montreal, then changed flights, and after arriving in Arctic Bay, still had a 25-mile trip by ski-doo.

They found the people living in government housing, heated with oil and cooking with hydro. They depend a lot on the caribou for meat. However, they do have western food which is very expensive. Bread is \$3 a loaf and milk \$3 a quart - they use powdered milk and make a bread called bannock. Our children were taken on a seal hunt and were shown how to skin a seal. A huge bear was caught just before they arrived. The bear skin would bring quite a lot of money.

The land is very barren, and mountainous with not a lot of snow, but very windy. Daniel, a young lad of 16, when he arrived in Brampton asked how the trees grow so tall here, since Arctic Bay is above the tree line. His mother is a soap stone carver, and his father a hunter who works at odd jobs, including mining.

After leaving the Wilsons, they called at Maymar Farms to see the dairy cows, however he was more impressed with the horses that have competed at the plowing matches.

The children left Friday night a tired, happy bunch. After a full week's activities, including a trip to the zoo, CN Tower, Science Centre and dinner at the Old Mill, the children were sad to leave.

Many tears along with fond farewells were evident, as they boarded the plane. Having wrestled with the new life-style they found here for a week the children flew home to Arctic Bay and their old life-style. The trip was for many a big adjustment and a once-in-a-life-time experience.

### Hall deal sought

Halton Hills will be negotiating with Erin Township to establish a new formula for covering deficits at the Ballinafad town hall. A previous arrangement between the former township of Esquesing and Erin had each party split deficits if any arrived during the operation of the hall by the Ballinafad Community Hall Board. Concerned that neither the town nor the township have any control over operating costs, town staff have suggested that a municipal contribution should be made directly to the township toward the building's capital costs or a major expenditure. In the recommendation passed by the town's general committee last Tuesday night, staff also asked that additional requests for funds be sent to the township.
