# Geminis ponder strategy at annual general meeting

The Annual Georgetown Geminis Junior B meeting last Tuesday night at North Halton Golf and Country Club didn't provide any concrete answers to two questions on many shareholder's minds: mainly, will the club survive another year of operation and will they press further for amalgamation with the Acton Sabres.

However, the general concensus after the discussions were over was that yes, the Geminis can and will continue operating and no, the in the towel and try a merger with the Junior B Sabres.

Gemini president Zeke McCandless told the 18 members present at the annual meeting that he sees the financial constraints of the club and amalgamation with Acton as one Issue that go hand in hand.

He told the group that if Georgetown couldn't continue for another year, they should then consider asking Acton to join forces with

Dr. Boyd Hoddinott told the president he felt the Issue of merger should be looked at, but for the 1963-84 season and not the 1982-83 season.

The newly elected repre-sentatives are scheduled to meet in the next few weeks to discuss the options available to the club regarding operation for another year and a

proposed merger.

cit was \$7,178, but the Junior B club tabled a "foresecable deficit" for the 1981-2 season of \$4,860. The club is hoping that a major sponsor, Paramount, will come through for \$3,000 they had promised at the beginning of the season, even though the cumpany is experiencing economic problems of it's own. The promis-ed \$3,000 is included in the "foreseeable deficit" which would rise to \$7,860 if the company could not pay the

A motion was carried 9-4 to change the official name of the Geminis to the Georgetown Junior B "Athletic" club instead of "hockey" club in the hope that the federal government would give Georgetown the status of a charitable organization. This way, donations to the club would be tax decuctible, past president Bob Girdwood

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


