#### Cadets plan May 24 expedition It'll be another month or more before most of us are talking about camping,

but Georgetown's Royal Canadian Air Cadels 756 Squadron have already spent two weekends in the great outdoors and plan a third end-of-season expedition on the May 24 week-

Taking the first blg step toward the coveted Duke of Edinburgh Award Gold, which Prince Philip himself presents to recipients, Georgetown air cadets headed into the rugged

territory around Milton's Kelso and Rattlesnake Point conservation areas April 24 and 25.

Cadeta and their Instructors hoped to qualify for the bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award (with silver and gold to follow) by trekking 15 miles carrying 50 to 60-pound backpacks between the two park areas. About a mile and a half of the journey took them through knee-deep

swampwater. Cadet Astrid Bernhardt, who handles the squadron's public relations, reports that all participants made it to Rattlesnake Point alive, set up camp and then pigged out". Some had enough energy left for a game of football.

"The night's entertainment was a roaring fire, a star-filled sky, bad jokes" and a spontaneous quartet of crooners "singing songs not quite ready for the rest of the world". Then it was sleep time until 6 a.m.

"On the way back," Cadet Bernhardt reports, "the swamp was bypassed

and the seven miles were completed in about two hours. There was so much time to spare that the group rested on top of the escarpment at Kelso and looked out upon the rest of the world just taking in the sun and feeling great,


