## Public might meet trustees, councillors

There is a strong possibility a meeting to be held next Tuesday by the Halton board of education's finance committee will be open to the press and the public, finance committee chairman Bill Priestner told The Herald.

The special meeting was set up by the finance committee for Oakville, Burlington and Halton Hills councillors and chambers of commerce in response to negative criticisms of the board's 1982 budget.

The \$132 million school budget passed March 18, is 13.7 per cent larger than last year's and has roused controversy among businessmen, taxpayers and elected officials.

Trustees and town councillors are up for election this fall when their two-year terms conclude.

Mr. Priestner said the meeting will go through the same budget presentations, using the same overhead slides from the board's March meetings.

"I don't ask them to negotiate their budget with us and we don't intend to negotiate our budget with them," Mr. Priestner said.

"Sometimes people grandstand because the press is there," Mr. Priestner said. "I feel there's a lot of politics involved. We're afraid that because it's election year, they might want to make hay."

## Needs study postponed



A motion to form a needs task force proposed by Halton Hills school trustees Betty Fisher and Ariene Bruce was postponed to next January at the Halton board of education meeting Thursday night.

"There were many board members who were not willing at this point in time to involve the community in a round table discussion of our needs and expenditures," Mrs. Fisher told The Herald.

She had made the recommendation in response to budget criticisms by Oakville and Burlington chambers of commerce in April.

She said the proposed task force would be made up of trustees, town councillors, educators, businessmen, and taxpayers working together to keep future education costs down. Such a body might encourage the ministry of education that cutbacks are harmful, she said.

"If they're not ready for this type of committee, there's no use having a narrow majority vote for something if people are not happy with it. It won't work unless people have their hearts in it," Mrs. Fisher said.

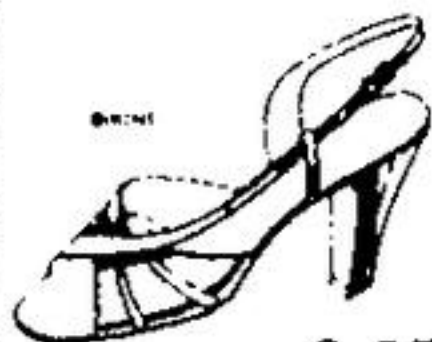

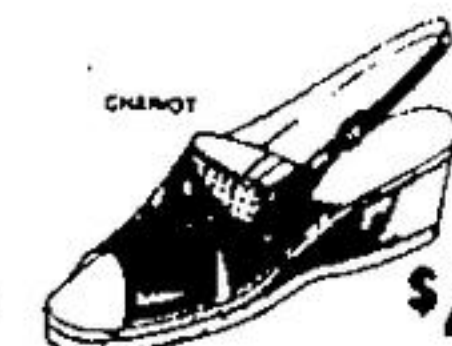
